**In Memoriam.**

"Good actions crown themselves with lasting days; Who well deserves needs not another's praise."

Nineteen years ago the R. C. Academy was formally opened by His Lordship, the Most Rev. R. Macdonald. The memories of those who participated in that memorable event will carry them back to the installation of the first Principal, J. J. Wickham. He was born at Yarmouth N. S., 38 years ago, and his parents moved to P. E. Island when he was quite young. He eminently successful college career at home was crowned by a course of study at Rome. In the educational forward movement, which His Lordship inaugurated in the early eighties, his keen eye winnowed out young Wickham as the man to suit him. And who on looking back to the academy in the hey day of its prosperity can doubt that the choice was a wise one? In the course of five years the academy became famous as a seat of learning and its scholars were second to none in the Island. In 1888, he was appointed to the superintendency of R. C. schools, in succession to the late M. Fenelon, and for 13 years, despite delicate health and the then limited facilities for traveling, he fulfilled his duties faithfully and zealously. At the inception of the Council of Higher Education he did the lion's share of the preparatory work, and its deliverance from the troubled seas in which it found itself at the time of its birth, was in no slight measure due to his masterly abilities, watchful care and keen foresight. An aggravated attack of that dread disease, consumption, compelled him to retire on a pension about two years ago and upon his retirement the teachers presented him with a beautiful address and purse, which bore testimony to the sterling worth of the Inspector, whose words and actions in their behalf were extolled as the very pink of propriety and sympathy. He sought his native air with the hope of regaining his health but those who were in close touch with him lately knew there were dangerous symptoms and suspected a collapse at any moment. The end came Sunday the 10th of June, and our friend, J. J. Wickham, is no more. That charming little island of the Gulf contains his ashes, but his memory will live in the hearts of many Newfoundlanders, with whom he spent the best days of his life and for whose many qualities they had so profound a respect. An honest man, a scholar, a lover of fair play, a gentleman. Such was J. J. Wickham. A pathetic interest attaches itself to the three bereft Newfoundlanders in a foreign land—the mother and two boys and we offer them our deep sympathy. Especially so to the widow, a fair lady of Hr. Grace and second daughter of the late Thomas Greene, of seal-killing fame.

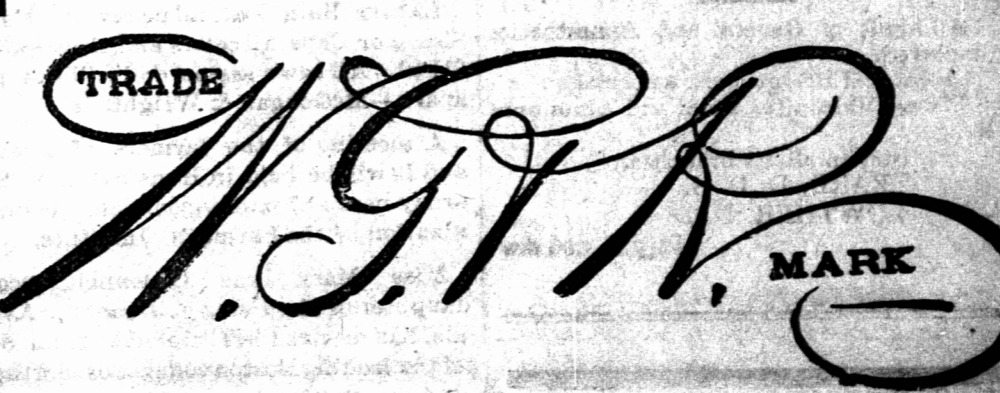
