MONCTON, July 28.—John Holland, a well known resident of Woodside, died shortly afterwards of his injuries run over Friday evening, and Juries. MOTOR BOAT EXPLODES ONE MAN KILLED.

MONTREAL, July 28.—An explosion on a small motor launch opposite Sherrington Park, on Lake St. Louis today resulted in the death of one man and the serious injury of two others. Medard Paiement, owner of the boat, had taken five friends for a cruise, when the explosion occurred and the craft took fire. Oscar Sadve, aged 23, a barber, who lived at St. Anne De Bellevue, with his mother declared that he would swim to shore, and leaped overboard. Fifteen feet from the shore he went under and was seen no more. The body was recovered late in the afternoon, Medard Paiement, the owner, and Sanglell were severely burned and others of the party sustained minor burns, but they were taken off the burning craft just in time by boats which put off from shore on seeing their danger. The launch is a total loss.
