LONDON DAIRY MARKET

BUTTER
A prominent feature of the market at the present moment is the continued scarcity of finest descriptions, and exceptional prices are ruling in consequence. There is also an active demand for secondary and inferior butters, and prices generally are about 2s. to 4s. dearer than last week.
Australian and New Zealand—it is now almost impossible to obtain supplies of these butters, and for the few lots offering ex cold store, very high prices are realized.
Argentine.—The Highland Pride which broke down on the journey to London and put in at Bordeaux, has now effected the necessary repairs and is due to arrive here about the end of next week. There are about 1500 boxes on board and the season may now be considered as finished.
Danish.—The official quotation has been advanced 5 kroner, and now stands at 145 kroner which is the highest on record. Notwithstanding these abnormal prices, stocks are well cleared and quotations are firm at our figures.
Siberian.—There is a very active inquiry for all grades, but particularly for strictly choicest quality, which is scarce.
Following the lead of Danish, this market is exceptionally firm and prices show an advance on the week of from 2s to 4s. per cwt.
France.—The market has been advanced 4s. all round, and prices are firm at our quotations.

CHEESE

Although there has been more inquiry during the last fortnight at the reduced prices, the demand generally is disappointing.
Canadian.—Arrivals 35,213 cwt. C.I.F. values which a few days ago were as high as 74s. to 75c. have again declined and today's cables are round about 71s. to 72s. for best selections.
New Zealand.—Arrivals 5,669 done Market continues quiet.
States.—A fair trade has been done for the best goods, but secondary and inferior sorts are very slow sale.
Australia.—There is still a fair quantity of colored cheese on hand ex "Walpara," but little or no White Cheese is now obtainable. Prices are unchanged from last week.
