proceedings of the House of Commons, and that she had been damaged in her reputation and held up to ridicule and contempt as a result. The defendants, by their defence, said that the words complained of were in their natural and ordinary meaning no libel on Mrs. Braddock, and that they were incapable of bearing the meanings which she attached to them or any meaning defamatory of her. In the alternative, they pleaded fair comment or justification. The Lord Chief Justice, in the

course of his summing up, said there was a remarkable conflict of evidence in the case, but he was quite sure that all the witnesses on both sides genuinely believed that they were telling the truth. The question was which side was accurate. If they (the jury) thought that Mrs. Braddock had walked across the House quietly and deliberately, then it would be wrong to say that what she had done was to dance a jig. On the other hand, there was the evidence of members of Parliament and of members of the Press Gallery, who gave evidence for the defendants, that she did not cross the House in that deliberate manner. When a person was said to have

danced a jig it did not mean that they actually performed the steps of the dance known as a jig. Mrs. Braddock would naturally have been feeling elation at the passage of the Transport Bill. If, however, they (the jury) thought it an unfair exaggeration of what she had done to say that she had danced a jig they would find for her. If they thought it a fair description, they would find for the defendants.
