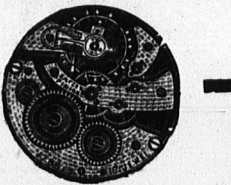

LUTHERAN PASTOR KILLED IN INDIANA.

GARY, Ind., Aug. 25.—The murder of the Rev. Edmund Kayser, pastor of the St. James Lutheran Church, in Tolleston, a suburb, whose body was found near his home last night, occupied the attention of the entire local police force today. The preacher recently had appealed to the police for protection, threats having been made against him, because of his pro-German utterances.

The body was found in a vacant lot adjoining the ministers home, in a community of Slav steel workers. There was a bullet wound in the throat and a window cord was wound tightly about his neck. The Rev. Mr. Kayser was born in Bavaria, forty years ago.

The ice house is in a separate building to the north of the kitchen. The water is obtained from a spring, well 400 feet deep. The power house will be constructed in the vicinity of the well and the plant will include three circular tanks with a capacity of 8,000 gallons each, an oil engine fifteen h. p. and dynamo. This plant is being installed by Messrs. Lunt Moss Co. of Boston.

The sewerage is conveyed from the premises by three sets of pipes to a main drain which empties itself into a septic tank about 500 feet southeast of the building. The fluid is distributed underground with tiled drainage over an area of 4,000 feet.

The whole of the work has been under the personal supervision of Mr. L. C. Hayden, Elmsdale. The grounds consist of 50 acres, 10 acres of hard and soft wood behind the building and 40 acres, allowing plenty of room for the patients to roam at will or develop their own garden patches.

He had always been a staunch Conservative and had always done his best to stand by the Liberal-Conservative party, which, both locally and in the Dominion, he considered had worked hardest in the interests of the country. (Cheers.) So far as the local Government was concerned, he said, without fear of contradiction, that the Government led by Premier Mathieson was absolutely the best the Province had ever had—(hear, hear)—and no man could gainsay it. It had done everything that possibly could have been done in the interests of education and agriculture, and the Public Works were a credit to the country as well as the Government. (Cheers.)

The roads were in better condition than they had ever been in before. The Dominion Government had also done more for the country and this province than any previous Government. In regard to the Premier's salary, he thought Mr. Mathieson more than earned what he received. He was by far the best and ablest Premier the province had ever had. If the present Government were turned down it would be the greatest misfortune that ever befell the country, but he knew the people were too intelligent to do anything of the kind. (Cheers.) In conclusion he expressed the greatest confidence in the return of the Conservative Government.

On the motion of Mr. Blake, seconded by Mr. Alex. Horne, Dr. S. R. Jenkins was unanimously nominated as a candidate; and on motion of Mr. W. H. Aitken, seconded by Mr. D. O'M. Reddin, Mr. James Paton was also unanimously nominated.

Mr. Paton thanked the meeting for the nomination and said he would endeavour to justify the confidence placed in him. It was gratifying that such an overwhelming audience should give him their unanimous vote. He had not sought the nomination and had asked no man to vote for him. It was needless for him to go into details in regard to the record of the Government. Everyone was well aware of what had been accomplished during the past four years and could, by obtaining the necessary documents at the Provincial Building, verify the facts for himself without reference to any newspaper. The Government led by Premier Mathieson was, he said, the best the province had ever had, and the Premier the cleverest man that had ever occupied the position. Mr. Higgs had said, at the Liberal Convention, that the country was "flying with milk and honey." They had to thank the Mathieson Government to a large extent for the fact. (Cheers.) Mr. Paton promised, if elected, to see that everything possible would be done for the advancement of the interests of the city.

Mr. Reddin explained that Dr. Jenkins was unavoidably absent, having been just called away on an urgent and critical case and having asked him to tender his apologies for his absence. Mr. Reddin also, in a few remarks, thanked the meeting for having nominated Dr. Jenkins, who he said was a staunch Conservative "up to the hilt."

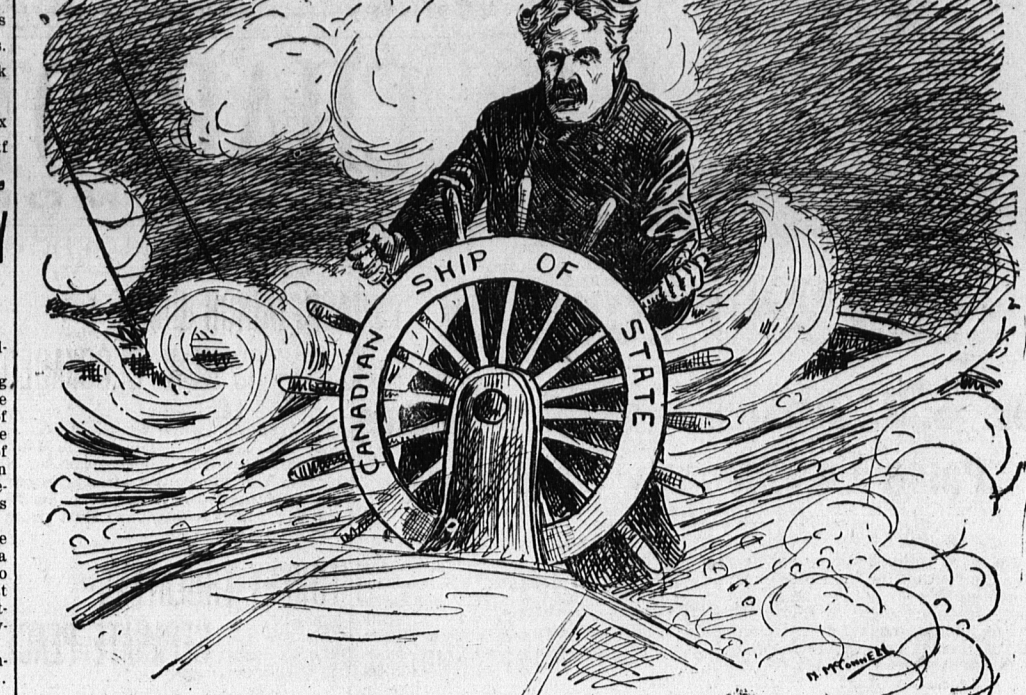
He referred in complimentary terms to the splendid work of the Government during their administration of the affairs of the province and commended the Premier on the efficiency and capacity which he had brought to bear on his labours in the interests of the province.

Mr. Blake then moved a vote of thanks to the chairman, which was unanimously carried.

THREE HUNDRED MILLION BUSHELS OF WHEAT IN WESTERN CANADA

CALGARY, August 24.—Three hundred million bushels of wheat for Western Canada is the estimate made by Andrew Kelly, President of the Western Canada Flour Mills, who arrived here this morning from Winnipeg. Mr. Kelly firmly believes that

the wheat crop will touch the 275,000,000 bushel mark.

HALIFAX, Aug. 24.—Coming in contact with a live wire charged with 2,200 volts of electricity, caused the instant death today of Ross Wheaton the fence foreman of the Cook Construction Company, employed in excavating the right of way from Fairview to the south end terminals.

Mr. Wheaton was a young man of twenty-eight years. He was a native of Petitcodiac, N. B.

BERNSTORFF MUST GO SAYS COLONEL HENRY WATTERSON

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 25.—Col. Henry Watterson, in the Courier-Journal, says: "It is the last straw that breaks the camel's back."

"Long ago should Count von Bernstorff been given his passports. Now he must go, and along with him the whole imperial outfit will have to walk the plank."

"The country has suffered enough in its dignity and its peace. Invaded by a horde of secret service agents, who found here a body of reservists already organized and prepared to meet them, there has been no time when Germany was not making war upon us. Her hirings have threatened us with civil strife. They have threatened us with political destruction."

"The time has come when we shall send the officials away and compel the domestic leaders, the subsidized editors and volunteer spies to know their place."

"It may be that not until we have hanged a few of them will they learn that the United States is a government and that America belongs to the Americans."

"We have neither right nor reason to doubt the President. His attitude admits of no further parley, equivocation or delay. The people en masse demand the suspension of all relations with Germany, and we believe he will promptly answer the summons. Berlin will ascertain, when it is too late where we stand. To hell with the Hohenzollern and all his agents, his works, his ways, and up with the flag of the republic!"

JAPAN BUSY IN SHELL PRODUCTION

TOKIO, Aug. 24.—Premier Okuma and Minister of War Oku have paid a visit to Nikko to report to the Emperor their plan for increasing the supply of munitions, in accordance with the decision recently reached to employ all available resources both governmental and private for the nation's output in aid of Japan's allies in the war. Afterwards the Premier and war ministers conferred at length with the Ambassadors of allied powers. Orders have been despatched to the foundries and factories of the empire that are engaged in the production of munitions to rush their work.

MANY FIRES IN WESTERN COUNTRY.

WINNIPEG, August 25.—A number of fires are reported from various parts of the country. For obvious reasons not nearly all of these find their way into print. It is understood that the military authorities are considering some exceptional measures. A week ago a well known southern Saskatchewan farmer was notified anonymously that his crop was to be burned down, because he was too energetic in what he had been saying about German settlers in his district. He treated it as a joke, but last week fire started mysteriously in his ripe grain and more to the absence of wind than to any preventive measures he could take, his entire crop with buildings and stock was not destroyed. In another case a time electric appliance for starting a fire was picked up.

GERMAN PAPER ON ARABIC OUTRAGE.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—The Hamburg Nachrichten, in an editorial, says a despatch from Amsterdam to Reuters' Telegram Company, hopes the report that the sinking of the White Star Liner Arabic was caused by a torpedo, will be confirmed, because the newspaper contends, since the Lusitania disaster, only rarely have vessels of more than 5,000 tons been sunk by German torpedoes. "It has been said with sufficient clearness to the Washington government in notes from our foreign office," says the Nachrichten, "that we can in this war against an enemy like England, renounce no weapon and least of all, one of our most effective weapons."
