WANT SERVANTS.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., July 12.—In a newspaper interview, T. E. Sedgwick said that in the South Island he had found that the demand for girls as domestic servants was quite as great, if not greater, than that in the North Island. People were generally agreed, he said that the trained domestic servant from England was not the best adapted for domestic work in the Dominion. This was borne out by the fact that several girls who had come out this year as domestics were now in tea-rooms etc. Several people mentioned that they were willing to pay \$4 to \$5 a week for girls to help in the house. The matter would, of course, have to develop slowly, but there was no reason why it should not develop on the same lines as the scheme of the boys. Many farmers had expressed a willingness to take widows, even with one child, and it was generally thought that girls from orphanages and other institutions, from sixteen to eighteen years of age, under good supervision, would do well, and would find the life far better than factory work or even domestic service at home.

1,180 ACRES GAINED EACH YEAR BY BRITAIN FROM SEA

LONDON, July 12.—The fact that the United Kingdom is growing in size yearly instead of shrinking is pointed out in the final report of the Royal Commission on Coast Erosion, the Reclamation of Tidal Lands, and Afforestation, which has now been printed.

It is estimated that during the last thirty-five years about 6,640 acres have been lost by coast erosion, while 48,000 acres have been reclaimed from the sea. The losses have been chiefly on the open coast, and the gains almost entirely in the tidal estuaries.

Erosion has been most serious on the east coasts of England and Ireland, and would have been far from serious but for extensive works carried out by local authorities. From a national point of view, the report states the extent of erosion need not be considered alarming, but in order to deal effectively with the situation remedial measures are necessary. Administrative changes are recommended and a closer and more sympathetic co-operation between a central body and local authorities and private owners. It has been found possible to lay down any general rule for defensive operations applicable to all parts of the coast line, but it is pointed out that some central controlling authority is essential in view of the loss sustained in the past by the wrong type of defensive work type of defensive work being undertaken.

The commissioners recommend a simplification of the law effecting the administration of the foreshore, particularly in Scotland, and that the duties now developing on the Commissioners of Woods and Forests shall be transferred to the Board of Trade.

Another important recommendation is that a clear right of passage by foot on all foreshores in the United Kingdom, whether Crown property or not, shall be conferred upon the public, in addition to the rights of navigation and fishing they already possess.

A further important proposal is that the Board of Trade shall be constituted the central sea defence authority for the United Kingdom, and that the Public Works Loan Commissioners shall be employed to issue loans on the security of the rates.

There are, the commissioners are convinced, considerable areas of tidal lands, especially in Ireland, which could be reclaimed—with profit—to the community, and the reclamation of which might give opportunity for the utilization of unemployed labor. They recommended that the Board of Trade should be charged with the duty of scheduling such lands, and should be given compulsory powers for their acquisition.

As a practical measure they recommended the growing of marrum and other grasses on sand dunes. In conclusion, the commissioners say they cannot recommend grants from public funds, as any general policy of that sort would subject the State to serious difficulties and should not be encouraged. They do not think the responsibility for sea defence rests primarily on the nation at large, "nor is there any obligation on the Crown to defend the coasts of the United Kingdom from

ANNOUNCEMENTS

SAYS SMOKING IN PUBLIC WILL SOON BE THING OF PAST

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, pure food expert, predicts that within fifteen years smoking and tobacco chewing in public will have become obsolete. Dr. Wiley is one of the incorporators of the Non-Smokers' Protective League, which sought a charter in New York last week. Said he yesterday: "A man has a perfect right to drink, smoke, chew or dip snuff in his private sanctum, but has not the shadow of a right to inflict unwholesome smoke and his vile breath on the community at large. There should be a law, strictly enforced by the authorities, prohibiting smoking and chewing in public places or on the cars, where other persons are obliged to be."

Dr. Wiley admits that a person, even of the gentle sex, may drink a "table-spoonful of mellow rye" or puff a cigar or cigarette without harm, but that is no excuse for the publicity of the deeds.

"What is this new campaign, doctor?"

"It's no campaign. It's a sure-enough crusade against the use of tobacco in public," said he, "the abolition of public smoking and chewing, the purification of the air. It is a crusade for the relief of persons who do not use the weed and whose nostrils are outraged by tobacco smoke. Neither I nor my compatriots object to a man smoking his head off if he cares to—provided he does it at home or in the woods or meadows. But not where other human beings are liable to be. It is not fair."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at an agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.—Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
