SERIOUS FIRE.—Fire on Sunday night completely destroyed the fine large building of the Brick and Tile Company's plant at Richmond, situated about a mile from the station. Boys' and Girls' Club At Amherst Fair

The teams representing the Boys and Girls Club and Heifer Clubs of Prince Edward Island returned to their homes last evening from the Big Show at Amherst where they entered into competition in judging and in the ring, with teams from a very large number of Clubs from Mainland points. These juvenile farmers, who were under the coaching and direction of W. R. Shaw, Livestock Superintendent, who was instrumental in organizing these Clubs, are very enthusiastic over the trip and have been greatly encouraged to go forward with their work with increased vigor and energy.

Records Of Heroes Started By Watts

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Visitors to the small open space which adjoins St. Botolph's Church, Aldersgate, will have observed that the cloister memorial, erected through the efforts of the late George Frederic Watts, the painter, is no longer a mere tablet which refers to a police constable who was killed in an air raid while saving the lives of women and girls in 1917. In the centre of the cloister is a miniature statue of Watts, "who," an inscription states, "desiring to honor heroic self-sacrifice, placed these records here."

For some years after the death of Watts the work of continuing the records was carried on by the Heroic Self-Sacrifice Memorial Committee associated with St. Botolph's Church, which included the vicar and churchwardens. Although considerable space is available in the cloister for further records, the erection of tablets has ceased owing to lack of funds.

Deputy T. H. Ellis, the parish clerk of St. Botolph's, states that there is a desire to continue the records, and particulars of acts of heroism have been received, but there is no money available. It has been suggested that an appeal should be made for funds to enable the committee to continue the work which Watts began.

SCHOONER IN TROUBLE.—A Shediac, N. B., despatch says that the schooner Garland, Capt. Trenholm, Summerside, for Richibucto, to land lumber for Richard O'Leary, has been forced to abandon the trip and proceed to Pictou for repairs. The Garland, while on a recent voyage up the Northumberland Strait with a cargo of coal struck a sand bar. Later she was in Shediac harbor for eight days awaiting a favorable wind to proceed to Richibucto. She sailed last week with Pilot Olaf Hendrickson leaving her at Cape Tormentine to run in rapidly the vessel was headed for Pictou. Wheat Smut

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4.—Proper disinfecting of seed wheat to destroy the germs of the disease commonly known as smut would save the farmers of the United States millions of bushels of wheat annually. It is estimated that in 1924 more than 24,000,000 bushels of wheat were destroyed by smut on American farms. The estimated loss for 1926 was 10,000,000 bushels.

There is "flag" smut and "loose" smut, but it is "stinking" smut, a fungus growth existing as a raised orange or dead fish, that sometimes wipes out entire fields, or sends the market value of wheat down from 2 to 20 cents on the bushel.

In Kansas City alone losses on smutty wheat due to market discounts have run as high as \$7,000 in a single day, and \$123,000 in one month. Millers cannot make flour of such wheat until costly machinery has separated the smut.

For years the Pacific Northwest bore the burden of wheat smut infection. Spores, thriving in untreated seed, grow in the green plant, usurping the place of grain when the heads started forming. Recently the disease has made strong attacks east of the Mississippi River. Scientists consider it a virulent menace, unless farmers disinfect all their seed. Thousands are doing it already, but there are thousands who do not. They are assured that a 100 per cent seed treatment where there is no soil infection will make possible a virtually clean wheat crop. Stinking smut is carried in the seed, and not in any way from one growing field to another.

In 1927 Darnell Smith, an Australian, found that smut-free wheat could be grown if the seed had been dusted with copper carbonate. Copper carbonate is cheap, is easy to apply, and does not injure the seed either in dry or wet soil. Treated seed can be stored without injury, the dust protecting it from weevil and making it unpalatable to rats and mice.

Many farmers disinfect their seed wheat by a simple home process, mixing in a rotator barrel or tank one bushel of grain and two or three ounces of dust. They wear a mask over the nose and mouth as they guard against the poisonous copper.

On the eve of winter seeding, government pathologists say, every farmer should make sure that his grain has been disinfected.
