CYCLES IN BUSINESS.
 Throughout America, and in less degree all over the world there has been during a number of years past a prevalence of prosperity. Now, there are evidences in the United States, and in less measure in parts of Canada that the tide has turned, or is about to turn toward a period of depression. Careful observers have noted that periods of prosperity and depression have thus in turn succeeded each other with such regularity as to indicate an underlying principle or law by which such movements are governed. A New York financial writer has tabulated these seasons of advance and decline in the United States since the close of the war of the rebellion. We give his table below, and it will readily be noted by those of our readers who have been observant that there have been like cycles of trade expansion and decline in Canada since the formation of the Dominion:
 Years 1868 to 1873, a period of advance.
 Years 1873 to 1877, a period of decline.
 Years 1877 to 1882, a period of advance.
 Years 1882 to 1885, a period of decline.
 Years 1885 to 1892, a period of advance.
 Years 1892 to 1896, a period of decline.
 Years 1896 to 1902, a period of advance.
 It will be seen that the present period of prosperity has reached the full term of six years, and if the law of recurring good and bad cycles in business is to hold good a period of decline must shortly set in. It has in fact already begun in the United States and is due to arrive in Canada. There is, however, apparent reason to hope that it may be neither very long nor very severe, especially in Canada. A succession of good crops, and the prosperous condition of our industries, the growing influx of immigration and the large expenditures promised for new railways and public works for years to come will help to tide over the approaching dip of less favorable times. And, of course, very much must depend upon the harvests of the near future.
