—MT. CARMEL EGG CIRCLE.—The patrons of the Mount Carmel Egg Circle met Saturday evening to hear the report of the business transacted during the past year, as also to elect officers, etc. Mr. M. G. Arsenault, the manager, gave a very good report. There are 103 patrons, 28,891 dozen eggs collected from Jan. 1st, 1915, to Jan. 1st, 1916; 26,412 dozen selected; 1,949 dozen small eggs; 510 dozen stale; 184 dozen bad eggs. Amount received for the year's work is \$5,858.79; average price, 19 1/2 cents; number of shipments, 47. When it is considered that up to three years ago this branch of farming industry was entirely neglected, it is gratifying to notice the vast improvement attained. Nevertheless, it is only beginning the work, the possibilities in this line of farming being limitless. Let everyone produce more eggs more cheaply and a great problem will have been solved. Since the circle started a spirit of union and co-operation has been manifest from everyone. As for the merchants, who might have been inclined to give opposition, the writer may say that the firm of Messrs Arsenault & Gaudet of Wellington have done everything to further the movement, and the circle has always found them gentlemen in the true sense of the word. 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FRENCH AVIATOR BAGS HIS FIFTH ADVERSARY.

PARIS, February 14.—Sergeant Pilot Guynemer, 21 years old, of the French Flying Corps, has just brought down his fifth German adversary and has been mentioned for his exploit in an official communication. Previously he had been decorated with the Cross of the Legion of Honor, the War Cross, and the Military Medal for other feats. Guynemer was a lad in college when the war began, and enlisted at once. He had never been in an aeroplane, but at the end of seven days of training he made his trial flight for pilot's license. Six weeks' training usually is required. His work at the front began in April of last year. It was not until Dec. 5 that he began to make his record by hunting German aeroplanes. At that time he brought down, single-handed, a large German biplane. Sergeant Guynemer flies alone, as did Garros and Pegoud, but instead of a monoplane he uses a great biplane, on which he makes ninety miles an hour. He accounted for four machines in nine days. In December the Sergeant fought a spectacular duel directly above the French lines, with his comrades-in-arms cheering him enthusiastically below. He was engaged with one of the famous Fokker aeroplanes, and though there were two men aboard the Fokker, he manoeuvred skillfully until he brought his gun in range. At a distance of fifteen yards he delivered a mortal blow. "The Old Charles" is the name given to the biplane which Sergeant Guynemer manipulates. It is armed with a weapon which it is not permitted to describe. He handles it with remarkable facility and deadly precision, at the same time manoeuvring his aeroplane with great skill. Between the times of his fourth and fifth successful duels Guynemer had a narrow escape in a fight with a Fokker. At the moment of firing, at a distance of thirty yards, his gun became unusable, the lubricating oil having frozen. He attempted a quick turn, but, carried on by the momentum, struck the German machine with his upper plane, and began to descend abruptly. After falling very rapidly for 500 yards the biplane righted itself.

BARKER WILL NOT ACCEDE TO THE THIRD DEGREE. Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 14.—Abso cutely refusing to yield to the "third degree" treatment given him by the police, but spending his time alternately prying and crying in his cell at the York County Jail, the young man known as "Harold E. Barker of Amherst," is awaiting the commencement of his preliminary examination in the police court tomorrow morning. In the meantime the only charge which has been preferred against him is that of issuing fraudulent checks, the one in which he was arrested, but the police are believed to be charging being lodged before many hours. So far "Barker" has declined to give any information regarding himself or his identity, but new stories as to where and when he has operated are constantly coming to light. One of the latest of these stories is that under the name of Quinn he put over practically the same thing on business houses in Digby, N. S. that he did in Fredericton, while the theft of electric lights from the Y. M. C. A. building has been added to the list of his crimes here. That he was apparently practically without ready funds while here is shown by the fact that when Manager Luke Morrison, of the Fredericton Company wanted a cash deposit of \$3 before he would place a meter in the house "Barker" had rented the stranger went away and never returned. Instead, he tapped the wires, for which he is liable to fourteen years in the penitentiary.

INJURIOUS MINE DUST.

The special report of the Miners' Pathology Prevention Committee on the percentage of injurious particles in mine dust and on the results of counting the particles of dust in the air was issued this morning. The committee, in its researches, made tests of dry and wet drilling under various conditions as far as possible on the same mine, the Village Deep. The tests for the efficacy of water blasts were made consecutively in one development end. A tabular statement attached to the report gives full particulars of each of the samples taken. The commissioner remarks: "During our investigations it was found that, in the use of Leyner drills care has to be taken that these do not become so leaky as to atomize the water used, unless such water is clean water, free from sediment in the case in point, mine water from the pump column was being used, and was being sprayed into the air by leaks from the machine, causing a dense fog. The sediment in the water, consisting largely of very fine injurious silica particles, was thus being transferred to the air and into the lungs of the person inhaling such air. The water contained no less than 23 million particles per c. c., and it was found that the dense fog created contained 9.2 c. c. of sprayed water per cubic metre of air, so that 210 million particles were derived from this source. The number of injurious particles per cubic metre of air was thus being increased from about 25 million particles derived from the drilling operations to 239 millions. It is obvious that similar contamination of the atmosphere takes place when dirty water is being atomized at any point of the mine. It is probably as dangerous to breathe the foggy air caused thereby as the clear air left after the evaporation of the fog. For atomizing purposes, only water quite free from injurious sediment should be used. A further point that emerges from our investigations is that, as a measure of the injurious character of any air breathed, the number of particles of dust per cubic metre is a better criterion than its
