The Lodges headed by the Fourth Regiment Band will leave the Lodge Rooms at three o'clock tomorrow and proceed to the People's Cemetery, where the service will be held, the band accompanying the hymns Nearer My God to thee, Lead kindly light (to Sandou) and the Sweet Bye and Bye. Roses will then be laid on the graves and wreaths in the Taylor family plot, in memory of the late Roland D Taylor, a member of Lodge Prince Edward and in the Clark plot in memory of the late Lawson Clark drowned from the steamer Elliott.

THE last issue of the Railway and Shipping World has the following concerning a well known Charlottetown man W. A. Winfield, who has been appointed Manager of the Telephone Co. of Prince Edward Island, was born at Derby, Eng., in 1879, and entered the service of the Nova Scotia Telephone Co. as night operator and switchboard repairer in 1895, removing to Windsor in 1897. He was subsequently made Superintendent of the Windsor district, and in 1900 was appointed District Superintendent of the eastern division of the company's lines, with headquarters at New Glasgow, N. S., remaining there until his present appointment. He is a brother of J. H. Winfield, General Manager of the Nova Scotia Telephone Co.

His Lordship Bishop Casey has prepared a circular letter, which he is sending to the priests of the diocese giving official information of the death of Pope Leo XIII and containing instructions as to what shall be done in each church of the diocese. The circular, after conveying the affecting but not unexpected intelligence that the much loved and illustrious Pope Leo XIII is dead, goes on to state that he was indeed, a Great Priest, that he was in truth the Holy Father, and while the church sincerely mourns his loss Catholics should not forget their duty to his departed soul and the necessity for the praying for the welfare of the church in her hour of need. Directions are given then for the draping of the church, the daily tolling of the bell, etc., until after the funeral. There are also issued instructions for a high mass of requiem in each church of the diocese for the repose of Pope Leo's soul.—St John Sun.

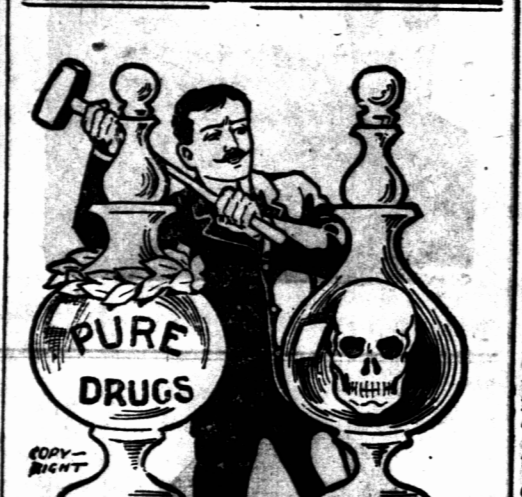
