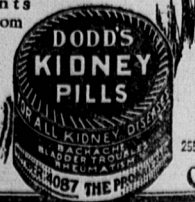

THE BREWERS' LAMENT ABOUT YOUTH

Rising Generation Drinking Less Beer

"The Brewers' Journal" recently contained the following: "Serious consideration is being given by the directors of a number of brewing concerns to the continuous decline in the beer output. In 1913, Britain's consumption of beer per head of the population was 27.76 gallons; in 1927, it was only 19.96 gallons. Since that date the tendency has been towards a further decline, and in England and Wales, during the year ended March 31st last, there was an actual drop in consumption of 5.1 per cent. compared with the corresponding twelve months of the previous year.

"It is rightly felt by all thoughtful members of the Trade that such a decline cannot be attributed wholly to economic causes. Taxation in the form of a beer duty more than ten-fold that which operated before the war is undoubtedly a considerable factor. Yet when due account is given to this and other exigencies, there also remains the issue to be faced that the percentage of people in the rising generation who are beer consumers is less than it was even a decade ago. This is largely due to the new competition which the trade has to face in the form of cinemas and cheap transport facilities. These factors are probably a greater influence than any lack of spending power on the part of the rising generation. Members of the brewing trade and allied traders with whom we have discussed this subject were unanimous in believing that unless the continuous decline in beer output receives from the leaders of the Trade the attention which its urgency demands, it may reach a point from which an increased demand will be much more difficult to stimulate than is the case today.

"Meanwhile, brewers, distillers, and wine merchants individually expend a sum which has been put at 3,000,000 pounds per annum in advertising their products. "The time has arrived when resources should be "pooled" for the good of the Trade as a whole. Further competitive and unproductive advertising will not meet the situation which, as things stand today, presents an outlook for the future that is anything but encouraging to the brewer and the allied trader. A serious responsibility rests with the leaders of the brewing trade today."

water, supplied three times a day, even to the warming of the grains before feeding.

75 hens disposed of in the last autumn, were three years old, and were still producing the usual amount of eggs with around \$1000, from their products, to their credit.

The present flock of pullets which were early May chicks were laying in November and give promise of being equal to if not exceeding the last flock. So far this winter (Jan. 15) from 55 laying pullets, the production has been around 100 dozen.

Mrs. Stewart always makes a point of having early May chickens, and finds she can have them lay as early, with less trouble, than the March or April chicks. One quarter of an acre of bush is enclosed with chicken wire 6 feet high, and in this is a house, and plenty of low bushes into which they can run for shelter from crows and hawks. In this enclosure the chickens are kept, until the time comes to put the pullets in winter quarters, and the cockerels in the crates to be fattened.

Besides barnyard hens, Mrs. Stewart has each year a large flock of turkeys, usually over one hundred, for which she receives the top prices when marketed.

But for "an all year round" money making proposition on the farm, she recommends a flock of from 75 to 100 Barred Plymouth Rocks.
