NEW YORK, May 7.—Crowds of men and women jammed the corridors of the criminal court building yesterday for the opening of the second trial of Charles Becker, the former police lieutenant and head of the "strong arm squad," for the murder of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal. Four men recently paid for the murder with their lives, but Becker, the alleged instigator, was saved

CIVIL SERVICE LEGISLATION

OTTAWA, May 7.—Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, gave notice last night of the resolutions upon which will be based the legislation with regard to the Civil Service and with regard to superannuation.

The Civil Service legislation will provide for changes in the classification of the inside service, and for increase of salaries and annual increases in certain classes both in the inside and outside service.

The resolution with regard to superannuation provides that the government may pay such allowances to an amount not exceeding one-half of the total allowances or benefit. The balance will be paid out of a fund contributed by the employees themselves.

SURVIVORS OF THE COLUMBIAN ARE LANDED IN BOSTON

BOSTON, May 7.—The Cunarder "Fronconia" today landed 13 men rescued from the burning steamer "Columbian." Several suffered severely from burns. Jas. Drohan, the Columbia's wireless operator said that the fire likely started from spontaneous combustion in the cargo of rags and junk. There is no further word of the third boat missing with nineteen men in it.

The survivors were so exhausted by their experience that they could tell little of what had happened. Two boat loads of survivors have so far been rescued.

COMMISSION TO STUDY SALE OF FARM IMPLEMENTS

REGINA, May 7.—A Royal Commission has been appointed by the Saskatchewan Government to conduct an inquiry into the manner in which the sale of farm implements is carried on in this province. They will make such recommendations to the Government regarding legislation as may be deemed desirable in the interests of both farmers and implement companies.

M'GILL GRADUATES WOMAN LAWYER

MONTREAL, May 7.—Final results posted yesterday in the faculty of law at McGill University for the first time in the history of the university contained the name of a representative of the fair sex, Mrs. A. M. Langstaff, the first woman to present herself as a candidate for the legal profession in this province, proved successful in all examinations and ranks fourth among the eighteen members of the class who will be granted the degree of B. C. L. at the university convocation Tuesday. It will be up to the Québec Bar Association to say whether or not Mrs. Langstaff shall practice, supposing she desires to do so.

MEXICAN AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON, May 7.—While Carranza, the real chief was parleying with the South American envoys over mediation it is learned that he hurled three of his principal forces against Huerta's troops. He defeated 3,600 federals near San Luis Potosi, captured 1,800 prisoners and quantities of arms and ammunition, captured Acapulco, Telis, with 1,700 men and a million rounds of ammunition besides arms and captured field gun and ammunition from the fleeing column that evacuated Monterey.

At midnight, seventy-two hours had elapsed since the boat cast off from the burning steamer. Its seventeen to twenty-four men of the crew left hurriedly with little food or water, and some suffering from burns. This boat was still the object of search yesterday.

Occupants of the two other boats which put off from the Columbian were safely aboard other vessels. The steamer Manhattan, bound for Antwerp, picked up Captain John McDonald and thirteen men yesterday. The Cunard liner Franconia, which has on board thirteen other survivors, will land them here today. The story of their experiences preceded them to port in a narrative sent by wireless by Captain Miller, of the Franconia.

The steamer Haverford searched all day for the missing third boat of the Columbian, without success, according to a message by wireless from Captain Mendus last night. His message said: "Six p. m. Have searched everywhere in vicinity where number one and number two boats were rescued, also where Columbian was abandoned. Sorry to say saw nothing of number three boat, nor of Columbian. Several steamers still searching." The Haverford was bound from Philadelphia for Liverpool.
