Anyway, it is disconcerting to find that apparently the modern youths and maidens are more concerned about the state of their pockets than they are of their hearts, for almost without exception both sexes rated money as the most desirable quality in a husband or wife. The girls all wanted to marry millionaires, preferably young and handsome ones, but any way millionaires. They also wanted their husbands to be good dancers and to have a taste for night clubs and stepping out, but the main consideration was the bank roll.

THE COOK'S CORNER
STRAWBERRY CREAM PIE

1 qt. box strawberries
1 1/2 c. granulated sugar
1 c. cold water
3 tbsps. cornstarch dissolved in 1-3 c. cold water

Select one cup of the poorer berries, remove stems and wash thoroughly, then place in saucpan with sugar and 1 cup water and allow to boil for 15 or 20 minutes (a slow boil). Strain through sieve, crushing berries with spoon. When all juice has been squeezed from berries throw away pulp and return liquid to pot; add 3 tablespoons cornstarch which has been dissolved in 1-3 cup cold water, stir constantly until mixture comes to boil, then simmer very slowly until you have a thick, heavy syrup. Prepare balance of berries. When berries are clean and prepared, cut into halves or quarters, according to size of berries, then pour boiling syrup over them and set aside to chill. Bake pastry shell, whip 1 cup evaporated milk and fill pastry shell with whipped milk, spreading it level. Put strawberries and boil for 15 or 20 minutes (a slow boil) on top and serve.

Price Control Questions And Answers

The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Hon. J. R. Reader, the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Why are electric stoves frozen? It is because of a shortage of electric power.

A. No, it has definitely nothing to do with the available electric power. The chief reason is the serious shortage of resistance metal from which is manufactured the wire used for electric stoves and electric heating elements. There is also a shortage of metals that go into the construction of all stoves. The freezing order was issued to ensure fair distribution of the limited number of electric stoves already manufactured and likely to be manufactured in the future to those whose buying is essential.

Q. I would like to have a turpentine lamp. Is there any chance of this?

A. The manufacture of turpentine lamps is limited to 2 inches in length (for size 16) is permitted in salt for fox. This applies also to red-lead.
