The 15 companies, along with N. L. Nathanson, Samuel Bloom, and J. S. Fine, face two charges of restraint of trade under the criminal code and a third under the Companies Investigator Act.

The Key To The Canadian Problem

The monthly review of the Bank of Nova Scotia says: The New Year begins with a keener realization on the part of Canadians, than ever before, of the conditions to be fulfilled, before prosperity can be restored. We no longer think of our problems as local problems, nor call for sweeping local remedies. To-day, there is a disposition to look abroad, and to realize that the fate of each nation in the western world is bound up with that of all others: that the Canadian problem, like Brazil or the United States, is Germany, New Zealand or Australia, Brazil or the United States, is in the first place international.

Each of these countries, however reluctantly the fact may be realized, lives in the world market. The health, even of its internal trade, depends upon the state of the world market.

In our own case, the key facts are these: During a normal trading year, four-fifths of the products of Canadian factories are sold in Canada. The purchasing power of the home market is thus of prime importance to Canadian manufacturers.

But one-third at least of the income of the Canadian people (in a normal trading year) is derived from the sale of raw materials, at prices governed by world conditions. One-fourth of the income of the Canadian people is still normally derived from agriculture a lone. This is the great "independent variable," which we cannot control.

As everyone knows, prices of raw materials, and of farm products especially, have been reduced to low levels; and so have curtailed the total income of the Canadian people, to a point at which the full employment of our manufacturing equipment is not now possible.

Our hope is that the conferences now meeting, and about to meet in Europe, may, by restoring the purchasing power of the large section of Europe, which are now paralyzed economically, create conditions permitting a greater absorption of our crops and raw materials, and a sustained rise in their prices.

Should they fail to create such conditions, a continued wide discrepancy between the prices of raw materials, and those of manufacturing products, is inevitable.

The sale, which opened on Monday, was grossed \$527,000 to date and will be concluded today.
