AN ELECTRIC LINE FOR SUMMERSIDE

It is hoped from the standpoint of Summerside and the western sections that the scheme may be successful and result in the upbuilding of the western town.

NEWFOUNDLAND MAKES PROTEST

Against American Evasions of Fishery Treaty—The Protest is Forwarded to Washington

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 6.—(Special)—The government of Newfoundland has forwarded to the British Cabinet a formal protest against American vessels hiring Newfoundlanders outside the three mile limit to assist in taking herring in Newfoundland waters, on the ground that this is an evasion of the treaty, which concedes the inshore fishery privileges only to actual inhabitants of the United States.

SOME DETAILS OF THE BRYAN CASE

The Case is not so Bad as Reported—Assistance From Government

Dr. H. D. Johnson, Health Officer, who had been treating him while at the Hospital, called there to see him and learned of his removal.
