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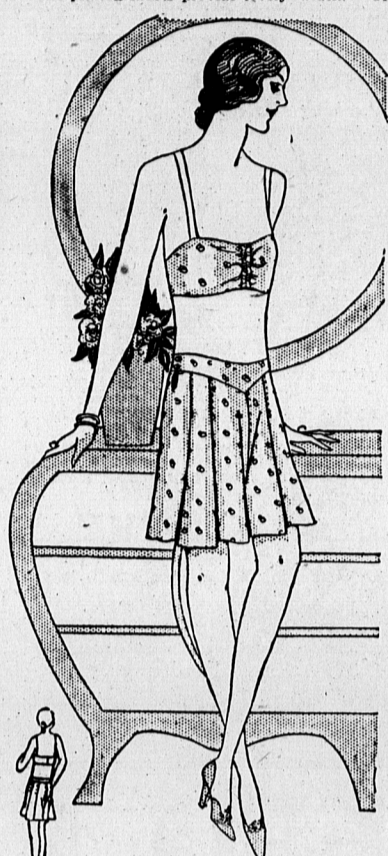

GLUCOSE CURE FOR ASTHMA

LONDON, Nov. 19.—(British United Press)—A great advance in the treatment of asthma has been achieved with the use of glucose—a form of sugar—by the special clinic at Guy's Hospital which is working under the auspices of the Asthma Research Council and the Medical Research Council.

This treatment derives from the successful administration of glucose to nervous children who suffer from cyclical (or recurrent) bilious attacks. It was found that many asthmatical children had these attacks, and the experiment was made of treating asthmatical children generally with glucose.

The result was eminently gratifying in the cases where asthma was allied with eczema and bilious sickness, and with the knowledge that has just been gained there is now definite hope of discovering a cure for this baffling disease.

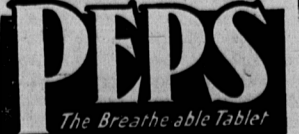

The annual meeting of the Long Creek Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. Wm. MacDonald on Wednesday evening Nov. 8th, with an attendance of thirteen members. The meeting opened with the singing of the Institute Ode and repeating the Creed followed by the reading of minutes of previous annual and last regular meeting and approval of same. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:—

It was moved and seconded that \$40 be given to the Hall Committee. It was moved and seconded that Mrs. W. E. Stretch, Mrs. Norman MacLean and Mrs. Hugh MacKenzie be on the program committee for a bazaar to be held in the near future.

Delightful refreshments were served by the hostess and the meeting closed with singing. Mrs. Hugh MacKenzie kindly invited the members to her home for the next meeting roll-call to be answered with "Christmas Suggestions."

The president read the following report: "The members of the Long Creek Women's Institute," Ladies! beginning at our last annual meeting in November 1928 I will in a brief report review the work of the past year; at that time I had been appointed president, Mrs. Fred Stretch vice-president and Miss Myrtle MacLeod, sec'y-treas., and those together with an optimistic band of members started out upon the new year, determined to work together with our watch-word for "home and country" ever before us, and tonight we see the consummation of our work crowned with success. The old maxim "seeing is believing," is plainly revealed by an inspection of our beautiful new hall within and without, the cost of the inside and also the outside decorations being practically all borne by the Women's Institute. Our finances have been increased by means of a very successful bazaar held last December of which the proceeds far exceeded our most hopeful expectations. During the summer Miss Irving of Charlottetown gave a very interesting and instructive lecture on our behalf and in October Zion Church Choir favored us with a concert all of which yielded favorable proceeds.

The sick have been remembered every month by all the members taking alternate turns in visiting them, and by their cheery presence brought a ray of sunshine to help them on to the speedy road of recovery.

Two of our most estimable young gentlemen brought brides to the district and these were entertained in the hall in March, and given a hearty welcome to Long Creek and were presented with a remembrance.

Before leaving on a trip to Detroit Miss Jean MacArthur was presented with a beautiful French ivory toilet set, but I am very pleased to report no members have left our Institute permanently to reside in other parts.

Our roll calls constituting both humorous and beneficial were always responded to in a cheerful manner showing the interest maintained in our Institute.

During the winter months an entertainment contest was carried out when the Institute was divided under two captains; a program consisting of various numbers being put on each night. At the close the losing side treated the winners to a delicious lunch of ice cream and cake. At our October meeting a "photo guessing contest," proved very entertaining there being a prize offered to the winner. In September the district convention was held in Long Creek and proved a decided success, all expressing their appreciation of the reception tendered them.

To show our interest along educational lines a resolution favoring the teachers' interests was sent to the government, also a card of thanks was sent through the press to show our appreciation of the financial assistance given by the government towards the erection and maintenance of the sanitarium. Undoubtedly it is needless for me to mention the funds sent in from our Institute for the sanitarium, but I cannot refrain from commending the hearty welcome and excellent support which we received when making the collections.

In August a very enjoyable picnic was held in Canoe Cove at a beautiful spot overlooking the Northumberland Straits when the members and their friends enjoyed a very delightful afternoon.

In closing I wish to extend my hearty thanks to the vice president who assisted me in my absence, to the secretary-treasurer for her invaluable assistance, to those who entertained us during the year and also to the members who by their interest and co-operation assisted us in our various offices and to the incoming officers I trust you will receive the same support as we have had.

The sec'y-treas. read the following report: "Madame president and Institute members:—On November 7th, 1928 our annual meeting was held when sixteen members enrolled, since that time eleven regular meetings have been held with an attendance of sixteen members, during the year our membership has increased to twenty-one. The receipts from membership fees amounted to five dollars and twenty-five cents, cash on hand from previous year forty dollars and twenty-five cents, government grant, two dollars, bazaar, eighty-one dollars and sixty-five cents, donation three dollars and fifty cents, lecture thirty dollars and sixty cents, play thirty-four dollars, concert forty dollars and twenty cents, the receipts for the year amounted to two hundred and forty-nine dollars and sixteen cents.

The expenditures were as follows: Present four dollars, we bought material for bazaar which cost twenty dollars and eighty-five cents, also curtains for hall which cost six dollars and fifty-seven cents, we gave to the hall committee one hundred and thirty-five dollars, also gasoline lamp which cost eleven dollars and seven cents. Miscellaneous, twenty dollars and forty-eight cents making a total of one hundred and ninety-eight dollars and sixty cents, which leaves us with a balance of fifty dollars and fifty-six cents.

The roll calls have been promptly responded to and many helpful suggestions given, also various contests held during the year. The annual convention held at Charlottetown was duly represented by two of our members who brought back a very satisfactory report. The sick were visited by our committee, and all have worked together to make it a very successful year. Trusting that the incoming officers may have the same support as we have had.


