DREADFUL REVELATIONS
Sir - If any thing more were needed than our police court records to convince any fair minded person of the ineffectual efforts that are being made to enforce our present prohibition laws, the pages of the March issue of the Temperance Bulletin will supply the evidence.

On page two of this issue of the Bulletin which is printed solely in the interests of the Prohibition Act we find the following very unpleasant reading extracts from a few of the many letters received by the Alliance Committee are quoted:
"Who is making moonshine and selling it to my husband be punished according to law."

Another woman writes: "I am asking you in God's name to send the raiders out, for my heart is broken, I have a man etc."
Another woman requests "Can't you send the officers, my boy is drinking himself to death, I can do nothing with him to save him from it."

A young man writes, giving his name in confidence, "I think it part of my duty to help enforce the Prohibition law in a proper way, not because of our standing in politics, but for the welfare of my brothers as well as relatives and friends."

Another writes "I am not a teetotaler nor a Prohibitionist, but I abhor all law breakers, bootleggers, moonshiners and smugglers, and would like to see them get their deserts" and then proceeds to give information regarding certain law violators.

Another writes "I am very much pleased with the way the Temperance Alliance is getting along," then conveys information regarding a violator who is referred to as "Hauling it to your town and selling also to our young boys. Isn't it wiser to think of the ruination of our younger men?"

In another letter giving information the statement is made: "Surely something should be done to close these dens. I am a Catholic and a strong temperance worker. Do something to close these out."

Another writes "I am not a teetotaler nor a Prohibitionist, but I abhor all law breakers, bootleggers, moonshiners and smugglers, and would like to see them get their deserts" and then proceeds to give information regarding certain law violators.

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Another writes giving information regarding certain persons who are reported as "making some vile stuff, and the effects on the young people around are very serious, both as regards conduct and indecent language. Trusting you will be able to do something to put a stop to this vile traffic and wishing you every success in your God-given task which is of such tremendous importance."

Another writes "I do not know whether I am informing the right party, but in the name of Christian fellowship I want you to take action against giving name and particulars of offence. "If you are not the party I ought to inform please pass it on to the right one."

What a frightful condition would be revealed if all the letters of a similar nature received by the Alliance were published and hundreds of others equally affected who don't write or complain to the Alliance. This, with the Doctors' evidence showing how well pre-election promises are being fulfilled.

RIGHTEOUS CAUSE FEARS NOT CRITICISMS
Sir - In attempting to fasten upon the Guardian charges of sedition and immorality for its outspoken criticism of prohibition and crush all opposition to the present law by the suggested expulsion from the Province of its offending editorial writers, the martinets who are responsible for the latest issue of the Alliance Bulletin are running true to form. These "reformers" even if shown as the Guardian has frequently pointed out - lack the saving salt of charity and tolerance of other's opinions which is the hallmark of culture. One can readily believe, from a perusal of the Bulletin, that culture and charity in any sense other than a purely verbal one are as little esteemed by them as the misused word "Temperance" with which they sanctimoniously label the heady broth distilled monthly in their official sheet and daily through subsidized columns of the Province - a species of moonshine, the manufacture of which, unfortunately, is nowhere prohibited against in provincial or federal statutes.

Surely a righteous cause has never yet failed through the criticism of its opponents, or needed to use the methods of a Mussolini to silence that criticism! Such barbarous practices have never been tolerated in civilized countries; its proponents have invariably been laughed out of court. If a journal representing the largest reading public in this Province dares to devote editorial space to challenging prohibition ideals and denouncing its measures as inquisitorial, farcical and stinkingly hypocritical, then it must be because a large body of people think and believe that such challenge and such denunciation are called for. People's opinions about prohibition will not be changed by "railroading" out of the province the spokesmen of their public sentiment. Others there will be to step forward and take their place - less eloquent, perhaps, less versed in eloquence, but fired nevertheless with the same convictions. Let not the Alliance Bulletin editors before themselves! Their opponents' name is Legion. Prohibition today is under fire from no isolated battery it is fighting a large and increasing body of public sentiment throughout the province. Hence the tactics so far pursued, of meeting opposing arguments with moral denunciations and personal abuse, have become useless and even dangerous. The time for forcing upon suppressing criticism of Prohibition is past. The dragon of public opinion cannot be slain by thus decapitating a few offending individuals or body of individuals. Out of the earth, out of every furrow, will spring armed men. The fight will go on, and the Alliance, having assumed dictatorial power and arrogated to itself the right to judge moral values and to annihilate its opponents, must bear the onus of its actions. It has engaged in a crusade in which a prodigious amount of dirty work has to be done; it has committed itself to a defense of that work and to tactics of espionage and petty interference with personal liberty unprecedented since the days of the Salem witch-hunters. In handling this pitch, if its hands have become defiled, it cannot logically protest against the honest criticism of people who have refused, from whatever motives, to reconcile such actions with Christianity or common decency.

Monthly, the shrill clamour for some extra-legal protection against the criticism of the Guardian grows more acute. Providence has been invoked; the "moral sense" of the people has been called upon; and even the legal authorities have been basebashed to put a stop to this continuous barrage of criticism against the established disorder of things! Still the trail grows hotter, and the outcries become more violent. A rapid degeneration of the vocal organs of the "Bulletin" into absolute incoherence is to be feared - or rather grimly hoped for! I am not a pessimist - believe that the good sense of mankind will ultimately prevail, and that the noisy demagogues who at present dominate the scene will take themselves off into deserved oblivion; and in the silence that will follow their departure we will be able to get together amicably again, and see what can be done rationally in the interests of liberty and freedom and Christianity.
