Urges Policy Of Prudent Courage Among Canadians

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—The Canadian National will go ahead with its program of betterments and extensions, Sir Henry Thornton, president of the railway company, assured a party of newspaper men today. Sir Henry spent the morning in conference with Hon. C. A. Dunning and had lunch with Premier Mackenzie King. This was his first visit to Ottawa since his return from England.

"This is no time to take to one's heels," Sir Henry said. "It is no time to shout pessimism but it is a time to be prudently courageous." His company had embarked on new works because they were needed in order that it could better fulfill its transportation responsibilities to the people of this country. These would be gone ahead with. The company continues to do its utmost to give its employees work and he did not see any reason for anxiety.

"I think there is more money to be made in England than in any other country in the world except Canada," Sir Henry asserted. However the methods both regards railway operations and various lines of production would have to be changed if Britain were to win back its industrial supremacy.

"Canada is trusted by all and as far as I could see, disliked by none and that cannot be said about every nation," Sir Henry observed in discussing Canada's position from an international standpoint. Canada and Canadians hold an unprejudiced position among the nations of the world. When Canada spoke at Geneva her words were listened to attentively with confidence in the sincerity of her motives. "This is all to the good, all to the advantage of the prestige of Canada as a nation."
