In The Passion Play

AUGUSTA FASSNACHT AS MARY THE MOTHER OF JESUS

The Passion Play

It is impossible to visualize the massiveness and beauty of the great production of the "Passion Play" as presented by the players from Freiburg, who will appear here at the Charlottetown Forum on September 8th for three days.

One of its most stirring scenes is that in which "Pilate" gives the rabble its choice between "Jesus" and "Barrabas." The mob asks that "Jesus," the Giver of Life, be crucified while "Barrabas," the killer be freed. This scene is a riot of color and action in which the entire cast, chorus and extras appear. These famous players believe it is their sacred duty to carry out under all circumstances. They lead simple lives and many of them have appeared in the play for twenty-five years or more; in fact, Augusta Fassnacht, who appears as "Mary," the Mother of "Jesus," has been appearing in the play for the last twenty-nine years, while George Fassnacht, who plays the part of "Judas," has appeared in the play for twenty-five years. Everyone should witness this great production of this beautiful and sacred drama and indications point to capacity audiences during its presentation here.

In speaking of the "Passion Play" the St. John Telegraph-Journal says:—

"The Passion Play of Freiburg, presenting in scenes of colossal magnitude and breath-taking realism the story of the Passion of Christ, which was given in the Vocational School last evening under the auspices of the New Brunswick Red Cross Society, was a religious spectacle far exceeding anything of its kind ever staged in Saint John, the audience agreed.

The play was presented under the distinguished patronage of Hon. Hugh H. McLean, K. C., V. D., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor. The large and representative audience attending the opening performance was held spell bound throughout the 19 scenes.

The reverent and sacred teachings are so deftly handled as to cause offence to no race or creed. It is a simple visualization of the life and death of our Saviour. George Fassnacht, jr., who assumes the difficult role of the Christus, leaves with his audience a long-to-be-treasured memory, stamping indelibly upon their minds the Saviour's teachings of love, reverence, meekness and charity.

Officials of both the local and provincial Red Cross Societies were present as well as many local and outside clergymen. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor was attended by his sister, Miss Maud McLean, and Captain Percy Flynn, A. D. C. and Mrs. Flynn."

As a scenic spectacle nothing can surpass this production of the "Passion Play," for the scenic artists have outdone themselves in both beauty and design in the magnificent stage settings. The play is now presented entirely in English and requires a cast and chorus of over 300 people.

SASKATCHEWAN SEES FARTHER FRONTIER

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Aug. 13.—Stretchers of the northland, heretofore regarded as purely mineral and timber area, will be dotted with bustling settlements if Major John Barnett's dream comes true. Deputy minister of natural resources for Saskatchewan, the major has completed a tour of frontier country north from Prince Albert by plane, viewing the Ile a la Crosse and Lac la Ronge country. A number of settlements, linked to the outside world by railway and other transportation facilities, situated in the Beaver Valley and along the Beaver river shores, are envisioned by the deputy minister. He was enthusiastic regarding the area north of Prince Albert and was convinced there were areas suitable for settlement, judging by the large stands of poplar trees he saw from the air.

Around Smoothstone Lake, he said, is another country suited for settlement along the Sled Lake and Montreal Lake areas. He declared possibilities. Land was fertile near Lac la Ronge and Ile a la Crosse. At the latter place he saw the finest stand of oats he had ever witnessed. Dense settlement in the two men will be sent into the country east of Montreal Lake to take a survey of land settlement territory, he said, was not feasible, but his plan was for a string of small settlements connected by railway and roads.

Timber abounds east of Montreal Lake, he continued. Trees measuring three feet through the butt can be found and there are millions of feet, mostly spruce, now at full-stage maturity. It is possible, he said, that following further investigation action will be taken to open up this part of the north to agriculture.
