MEAT INSPECTION.—The report of Mr. McNeill's speech at the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday was slightly misleading. —Mr. McNeill said that as far as he could see there was not much use in appointing committees until such time as they had Provincial inspection. Some three years ago they acquired the market house to have all meat hung there out of the dust and dirt and their was a regular protest from a section of the press and many citizens, with the result that meat is still exposed in the square. He was in favor of meat inspection but it must be carried out in methodical and systematic manner.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court yesterday four boys, whose ages range from 8 to 10 were up before His Honor, charged with stealing ladies' combs from the store of L. J. Reddin. These boys entered the store ostensibly to sell papers, and managed to get upstairs unobserved. The combs they sold to the volunteers. Among the lads were several who were up before His Honor on previous occasions. They were given a good lecturing and released on suspended sentence. If found on the streets after night they will be liable to arrest. They were also prohibited from selling papers in future.
