Over seventy teachers attended the annual convention of the Eastern Prince Teachers Association in the Town Hall, Summerside, on Tuesday. The meeting was opened by the President, Mr. Bertram Larkin who gave a review of last year's work...

Mr. Auld gave a short address on the work of the schools; Miss Pillman read a paper on the "Influence of Teacher on Pupils," Mr. Elmer Roberts, "Use of Illustration in School Work," Miss McLean, Junior Red Cross Superintendent, spoke on her work and was pleased to say there were 121 organized bodies in Prince County and 95 not organized.

Mr. Lloyd Shaw of Prince of Wales College gave a helpful address on reading and writing in the primary grades, dealing with words and sentences, rather than the old alphabetic system.

Miss Gillis proposed an all expense tour for the teachers; she also spoke on the value of study groups.

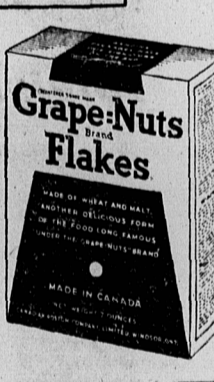
