

# Ottawa Puckmen Turned Back By Abegweits 6 To 2

## Upper Canadians Fail To Impress Local Fandom. Red Shirts Never In Danger Throughout Tilt.

Scoring two goals in every period and playing under wraps for a great part of the game Abegweits were successful in turning back the LaSalle-Hull pucksters from Ottawa last night 6 to 2 in a game that bristled with action in spots and again lulled to almost a standstill.

The Upper Canadians are a like-looking lot of puckmen who play mean hockey all the while, are fair stick-handlers but their exhibition of shooting on the net was sad to behold. A few of the forwards managed to trickle through the Red shirt defence, but actually shot ten feet wide of Bubar in the local citadel. Their skating too did not by any means measure up to the O'Connor clan who seemed to roam at will and back-check plays that at times left them flat-footed behind the blue line. All in all much more was expected from the Ottawa boys. However, it may be said that the visitors, fresh from a long journey were hardly in condition to give of their best, but even if they were to remain here a week, there isn't a doubt in the world that Abegweits would take them like "Grant took Richmond."

As above mentioned the game was cleanly played, only one penalty being handed out during the three periods.

The rest is history. Three minutes later the Red Shirts counted again when Beaton took a perfect pass from Gallant, the former driving the puck into the mesh.

# NORTHCOTT LEADING THE N.H.L. SNIPERS

## Toronto And Rangers Still At Top Of Respective Loops.

MONTEAL, Jan. 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—Two goals ahead of his nearest rivals, Lawrence "Baldy" Northcott of Montreal Maroons leads all other contenders in the National Hockey League point scoring race, according to figures released from President Frank Calder's office tonight.

With 14 goals and 7 assists, Northcott has been credited with 21 points. Bill Cook, New York Rangers wingman, with 11 goals and 9 assists for a total of 20 points, is only a point behind Northcott for the League Leadership, and has a three-point advantage over all others in the American section.

Northcott has scored more goals than any other National Hockey League player. Bun Cook of Rangers and Marty Barry of Boston each have twelve goals.

The two Montreal clubs, Maroons and Canadiens, are leading the Canadian section scorers. Howie Moroz, meteoric Canadiens centre, and Paul Haynes, Maroons sub pivotman, each have 18 points in a tie for second place behind Northcott.

The two Cook brothers of New York Rangers and Marty Barry of Boston lead the American section. Bun Cook with 17 points, trails brother Bill in second place and Barry has 16 points to capture third place.

Frank Boucher, smart Rangers centre has most assists of any player in the league with 13 credited to his name. Moroz is next with an even dozen, and Haynes of Maroons third with 11.

The league "bad man" is still Red Horner of Toronto Maple Leafs. Red has served 57 minutes on the penalty bench. Ching Johnson, husky Rangers defence, rivals Horner with a total of 52 minutes.

In contrast, Frank Boucher of Rangers served his first penalty of the season on Saturday night when he went off for a tripping infraction in the game against Maroons. Northcott garnered four points Saturday night against Rangers, scoring two goals and two assists. Paul Thompson of Chicago Black Hawks also picked up four points on Sunday night against Canadiens, putting in three goals and drawing an assist for his fourth point. Thompson's scoring spurge pulled him up beside Marty Barry in a third place tie in the American section, with 16 points made up of 7 goals and 9 assists.

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 2. (C.P.)—Sixty minutes of fast hockey found Montreal Canadiens, leaders of the Quebec Amateur Hockey League, victors over Moncton Hawks by a 1-0 score in an exhibition match here tonight. It was the only game scheduled for Montreal to play in the Maritimes, and the French team entrained for home after the contest. Hawks are members of the "big three" Maritime hockey league.

## Don't Blame It On The Cow

If you are not getting the results you should from your dairy herd don't blame the cow until you are absolutely sure that your feeding practice is sound. The Canadian dairy cow has been more maligned than she deserves because of the lack of knowledge of good feeding practices on the part of individual farmers. As a matter of fact, given an even break with good feed she will hold her own with the best dairy stock of any country in the world.

## Dairy Patrons

Under present day conditions many farmers must formulate rations for their dairy cows from the feeds available on the farm and limit the purchase of mill feeds to bare necessities. In order to balance the rations as closely as possible and supply the necessary food nutrients, plans must be made to grow the right crops in sufficient quantity. The farmers in Eastern Canada can produce a large part of the necessary nutrients for dairy rations if they make an honest effort to plan their crop rotations and acreages. Protein is the expensive part of the ration and it is the protein rich feeds that are necessary to balance the "home-grown" rations. The feeds of this nature that can be produced here are clover hay, alfalfa in some districts, pea and oat hay and grain mixtures containing peas.

A ration for a cow in milk that supplies about fifteen pounds of pea and oat hay per day and crushed oats and barley, one pound to each three pounds of milk, is about a balanced ration if roots are fed in addition. If no roots are available, bran should be added at the rate of one pound to three of the mixed grain. If the available hay supply is limited to mixed hay or timothy, it would be necessary to add a protein supplement to the grain ration. This may be oil cake meal, cottonseed meal, gluten feed or fish meal, 50 to 100 pounds for each 300 pounds of crushed grain, depending upon the protein analysis of the supplement available.

In formulating any ration, several points should be kept in mind. The ration should supply bulk, variety and succulence and should be palatable, as well as supplying 18 to 24 per cent of crude protein. It is also often necessary to supply more minerals containing calcium and phosphorus in particular. Ground limestone and edible bone meal particularly the latter, are excellent for this purpose and may be fed in the meal mixture at the rate of one to two per cent.
