—A SPLENDID LECTURE— Seldom, if ever has it been the privilege of the people of Hunter River and vicinity to hear and enjoy, a lecture so vividly and ably portrayed at that delivered by Rev. J. Sydney Bonnell in Hunter River on Thursday evening May 31st. His subject was "The Burial of the unknown Soldier in Westminster Abbey"—a subject based on the conception of a beautiful thought, for the burial of the unknown soldier beside England's illustrious dead, was an act pulsating with love and sympathy from the heart of the nation extended to all who had suffered and sacrificed in the great war, even to the utmost bounds of the Empire. Mr. Bonnell began by referring to occasions in British History when England honored her great men and when the hearts of the nation were turned towards the great leader whom death had claimed as in the case of the mighty Nelson, the Duke of Wellington and Victoria "The good." But never in her history had she paid such a tribute to honor and respect to any person under her flag as she paid to the "unknown soldier" that day in London. The audience were simply and in that frame of mind and hearts were carried in imagination by the mastery eloquence and brilliant rhetoric of the speaker, through the successive stages of that wonderful and inspiring ceremony from its origin on the blood stained fields of France to its termination in the historic Abbey of Westminster. Scarcely a detail was omitted and yet the lecture was brief much too brief in the opinion of the delighted audience. Rev. R. H. Staver, who was chairman, commented briefly



in commemoration of the lecture at its close Mr. Simmon Brown after a short speech moved a vote

of thanks which was seconded by M. Cutcliffe and supported further by Mr. Hodgson and Mr. D. M. Mac Donald. This hearty vote of thanks was tendered by the audience rising. Preceding the lecture the following programme was rendered and heartily appreciated by the audience; Chorus by the Presbyterian choir Solo—Murdoch MacLeod, encoired Duet—Hubert & Lila Thompson, encoired. Solo—Geo. Beers, encoired Reading—Dr. Green, encoired Solo—Mrs. Phillips encoired After a vote of thanks was tendered to all who had assisted in making the evening such a success the meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the national anthem. The total receipts were \$41.00 which goes to missions.

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JUVENILE MUSICIANS TO COMPETE FOR HONORS

CHICAGO, May 31—Approximately 350 school bands, made up of more than 6,000 juvenile musicians are in this city today for what is considered to be the greatest school band tournament ever held in this country. The tournament will be under the auspices of the Music Industries Chamber of Commerce, which opens its convention today and meets until June 7.

From the list of entries it is ascertained that every school band of prominence in the United States will participate in the events, while many bands that have been recently organized and whose ability is unknown, also are entered.

The bands are divided into three classifications: grade schools, high schools and military academies. They will be judged for their bearing while on the march as well for their musical ability.

The contests for today, tomorrow and Wednesday will be confined to high school bands. On Thursday the grammar school and military academy bands will be judged, and on Thursday afternoon there will be a mass concert in which all of the competing bands will play.

The convention itself is known as the "prosperity convention" and will draw dealers in musical instruments from all parts of the country. The exhibits will contain every musical instrument, from a grand piano to a Jew's-harp.
