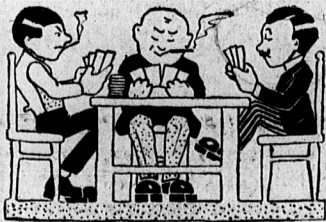

## SPECIAL TRAIN ORDERED.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Testimony tending to rebut the theory that White Star officials knew of the sinking of the Titanic hours before they announced to the world the loss of their ship was presented today at a special meeting of the Senate Titanic committee by Vice-President Campbell, of the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad company. It was he with whom Vice-President Franklin, of the White Star line, made arrangements to have a special train sent to Halifax to bring the survivors to New York.

Mr. Campbell said Mr. Franklin asked him to telephone to New Haven about 11 or 11.30 a. m., Monday to arrange to send train accommodation for 325 first class passengers. Two affidavits, one arraigning the conduct of Officer Low, of the Titanic, who was charged with blasphemy and brutal remarks just before the sinking of the vessel, were put on record.

Besides these, Senator William Alden Smith, who conducted the inquiry, is anxious to secure the testimony of Mrs. P. A. B. Widener and others regarding what transpired at the dinner aboard the Titanic just before the disaster.
