Life Insurance At New High Level

TORONTO, Sept. 24 - Reflecting experience in the last war, life insurance in Canada and Newfoundland continues to show steady improvement. The Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association reports that despite unprecedented demands on individual savings to meet war costs, life insurance business in force is at a new high and the outlook for terminations and cash surrenders is gratifyingly low.

For the month of August, according to figures compiled by the Life Insurance Sales Branch Bureau and released today by the Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association, sales of new ordinary business total \$99,963,000, as follows: British Columbia, \$3,537,000; Alberta, \$2,183,000; Saskatchewan, \$1,294,000; Manitoba, \$2,546,000; Ontario, \$1,261,000; Quebec, 10,554,000; New Brunswick, \$1,229,000; Nova Scotia, \$1,699,000; Prince Edward Island, \$44,000; Newfoundland, \$618,000.

These sales, which are based upon the experience of 18 companies representing 85 percent of the business in force, are for new settlements for ordinary insurance, exclusive of increases, renewals, dividends, additions, reinsurance acquired, pension bonds without insurance, and wholesale.

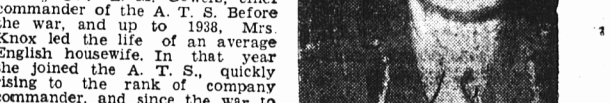
