Through a slight discrepancy on the part of the judges, three horses—Major Alto, Jacqueline, and Our Prophet were sent back to race for second and third positions, with the result that the old timer, Our Prophet, upset the dogs by winning the heat. The only course left was to send them back again—Our Prophet repeating the performance.

Mully and Paynter, the misplaced owners of Major Alto and Jacqueline accepted the situation with good fellowship—taking the will for the deed. Both races were characterized by the display of Camaraderie and game sport.

Rev. T. W. Goodwill, B. A. Receives Call TO PEOPLES CHURCH OF THIS CITY. REV. D. M. LAMONT GOES TO TORONTO.

At a largely attended meeting of delegates and others representing the congregations of the Central Parish, presided over by Rev. D. M. Lamont, a resolution was unanimously adopted to extend a cordial invitation to Rev. T. W. Goodwill, R. D. son of a revered former pastor, the Rev. John Goodwill.

The discussion that led up to this resolution was characterized throughout by the spirit of hopefulness and harmony. Mr. John Goodwill, in expressing his regrets that Mr. Lamont had made clear to them his decision to accept a call from Toronto, moved, in order to proceed with the business before them, that the resignation be accepted. Mr. Angus MacNem, in seconding, said he had learned of this resignation with disappointment and regret. Mr. Lamont had laboured among them for seven years, and during his incumbency there was remarkable unity and prosperity throughout the parish. There was also an encouraging growth of the church, and on the temporal side, all our churches are in good structural condition. Several of them (particularly Church Hill) have been recently renovated.

Mr. James MacFadyen, speaking for People's Church, said that never did this congregation show such signs of prosperity as now. Not only were the financial gifts of the congregation higher than any previous year, but the attendance at the S. School and the evening services showed an increasing interest and what was still more hopeful harmony and goodwill prevailed the congregation with a deeper sense of the divine presence in the sanctuary.

Several other speakers from various sections made encouraging speeches. The whole message and issue of the meeting seemed to be, "We have never been left without a Shepherd, let us keep united and prayerfully await upon the Lord to send us a Shepherd from his own right hand."

The Moderator called on an aged elder of the Church, Mr. Henry Compton, who closed the meeting with prayer.

PREDICTS MERGER OF MATCH PLANTS WILL PROVE BOON

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—While stating that the negotiations for the taking over of the E. P. Edly company's match interests were progressing apace, George H. Milne, president of that company, said that no definite decisions had been arrived at yet. He expects that the various head offices are in Montreal, will shortly have some announcement to make in the matter of the amalgamation.

"It will be a good thing for the match business," was his reply to the Star when asked what its probable effect would be.

Mr. Milne agreed it would create a virtual match monopoly in Canada, but contended the process would be beneficial in that it would eliminate many brands and

make production easier.
