MR. COOK'S DEFECTION.

Both the great political parties have their family troubles, and there have been some changes from side to side in consequence. The Liberals have claimed some prominent accessions from the Opposition side and now Mr. Herman H. Cook, formerly the Liberal representative from Simcoe, has not only turned against his old friends but has issued a sort of manifesto against the Liberal leaders, himself still posing as a Liberal of the old school.

Mr. Cook was born in 1837, and is a wealthy lumber merchant who resides in Toronto. He was first elected to the Commons for North Simcoe in 1872. His opponent was the late celebrated L'Alton McCarthy and the contest was a close one. Mr. Cook was unseated for corrupt practices by agents. At the subsequent by-election between the same contestants Cook was again returned by a slightly increased majority. In 1878 McCarthy was the victor over Cook; in 1882 and 1887 Cook left North Simcoe to McCarthy and was himself returned for East Simcoe. In 1891 Mr. Cook again tried conclusions with Mr. McCarthy in North Simcoe, but was beaten. In 1896 Mr. Cook contested East Simcoe and was beaten by Mr. Bennett, Conservative. Then Mr. Bennett was unseated and at a by-election in 1897 Mr. Bennett was re-elected, again defeating Mr. Cook.

Some of the greatest electoral battles ever fought in Ontario were those between D'Alton McCarthy and Herman H. Cook. Both had ample means and great fighting pluck. McCarthy was the trusted lieutenant of Sir John Macdonald, and always consulted by him on Ontario matters so long as Sir John lived. Cook, though a much less brainy man, also stood well up in the favor of his own party leaders. But after Sir John Macdonald died and Sir John Thompson came to be leader of the Conservative party, McCarthy was no longer consulted as before, and he gradually became estranged till in the election of 1893 he practically went over and gave his support to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He maintained this attitude till his death in 1893. This in turn reacted upon Mr. Cook, who after repeated defeats sustained at the polls in the Liberal cause, found his old opponent received with favor by the Liberal leaders and found himself passed over while repeated appointments to the Senate were being made.

It is a strange instance of what is possible in political life to find two men of such prominence and so stalwart in the party faith as were both Messrs McCarthy and Cook, each in his later life becoming the opponent of the leaders he had long supported and the ally of his former adversaries. We have no doubt that Mr. McCarthy's change of base was a predisposing cause toward the change which Mr. Cook has now made. As to the grave charge that Mr. Cook was offered a Senatorship on payment of \$10,000, it has been squarely denied by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Cook's published statement is that he was offered a Senatorship, for which he had applied, but declined it as "the price was too great." It remains to be seen what evidence can be offered in support of the charge. As party favors go Mr. Cook would have been entitled to a Senatorship on the ground of past party services, and therefore could hardly be asked to obtain it by a criminal sale and purchase.

As the Paris Exposition draws to a close, the silence of the Parisian press is being broken by fresh murmurings and threats against "perfidious Albion." France will seize the Morocco coast and nullify the importance of Gibraltar as the key to the Mediterranean. If Britain resists, Russia will aid France, and other continental powers will rest satisfied to see British prestige lowered. Such is the talk, but there has been much of the same sort during the days since the fall of the great Napoleon, in which long time the peace between the two near neighbors across the Channel has not been actually broken. The ravings of one or two Paris journals must not be mistaken for the voice of France.

A Republican journal finds fault that the jury who tried and found Caleb Powers guilty of the murder of Governor Goebel was composed of nine Democrats and only three Republicans, also that the jury now trying an alleged accessory to the murder has eleven Democrats on it. Party spirit must run very high when a juror in a most atrocious murder case can be suspected of being swayed by political prejudices.

It is unpleasant to read on the authority of Lord Roberts' report, that the Boers are still active over a large area. The fact that Lord Roberts has delayed his return to England, and has expressed his strong desire to retain the colonial troops until the close of the war must be taken to mean that the war is not so near its termination as many had fondly hoped.

General Laurie, the Gaiman veteran who from 1887 to 1891 represented Shelburne, N.S., in the Canadian Parliament, has been elected to the British Parliament.

And now it turns out that Newfoundland will have a general election on the same date as Canada, November 7.

It is said that it will cost nearly \$10,000,000 to lay the Pacific cable.
