Soviet Spokesman Snubs Neutrality Pact Committee

European Tension Over Spanish Civil War Increases As Russian Intervention Looms.

MOSCOW, Oct. 21—(AP)—Russia is ready to quit the Spanish Non-Intervention pact and send warplanes to the Madrid Government, authoritative sources said tonight. With the Insurgents striking ever-closer to Madrid, these sources said, the Kremlin feels that it must send munitions and planes as the only way to prevent establishment of another Rightist dictatorship similar to those in Italy and Germany.

Highest officials were agreed that recent developments growing out of the Spanish war have created "the gravest days" in Europe in two decades. Dictator Josef Stalin, informed persons said, is convinced that Europe is nearing the abyss of another war, and that Russia must make her influence felt immediately and in the strongest and most unmistakable terms.

To Send Warplanes It was reliably reported that Stalin had been told by his military observers that only 100 warplanes could turn the entire trend of the Spanish civil war in favor of the Madrid Government. Russia could make this number of planes available almost immediately, it was said on high authority.

The major influence on the determination of the Kremlin to aid Madrid, it was said reliably, was the increasingly bitter German anti-Communist campaign. Apprehension was felt lest the forthcoming Berlin conversations between Premier Mussolini's Foreign Minister, Galeazzo Ciano and Hitler might prestage a united Italo-German stand against Communism.

Action Friday LONDON, Oct. 21—(AP)—Informed observers predicted tonight that Russia would denounce the Spanish Non-Intervention Pact at the next meeting of the committee expected to be held Friday.

Otto Von Bismarck, German Charge D'Affaires at London tonight handed a note to Lord Plymouth, chairman of the Neutrality Committee, charging that Russia had aided the Madrid Government in violation of the pact. The allegations were contained in the German government's note replying to previous Russian charges of intervention by Germany, Italy and Portugal on behalf of the Spanish Insurgent Fascists.

Bismarck declined to make public the specific charges contained in the German note because of an agreement with Lord Plymouth. High sources declined to confirm reports that Russia had already arranged arms shipments to be sent to Spain the moment her representatives quit the pact.

Irked By Delay Action of the Non-Intervention chairman in asking Germany, Italy and Portugal to speed their replies to the Russian charges did not do much to placate the Russian representatives, plainly irked by delay.

No Election For Saskatchewan REGINA, Oct. 21—(CP)—Premier W. J. Patterson of Saskatchewan said today he had no intention of calling an election immediately. The Premier said he did not think it would be necessary to do so before 1939.

Fascists Triumph In Air Battle

MOSTOLES, Spain, Oct. 21—(AP)—Fascist airmen today shot down two Government war planes over Getafe airport, just outside Madrid, as Government militia retreated from Navalcarnero to this town, only 13 miles from the capital. The opposing air forces fought a dramatic battle over the airport, most important of Madrid's aero defences and home field for its aerial army. Swooping low, a Fascist gunner caught two Government machines with a machine gun fusillade. Two other Government bombers headed to the north for safety.

EXTENSIVE DEFENCE PLANS FOR CANADA

Expansion of Army, Air, And Naval Forces For A De quate Defence Purposes Planned.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21—(CP)—High up on the cabinet's agenda when Prime Minister Mackenzie King returns from Geneva are expected to be national defence plans. Comprehensive proposals for extension of the defence set-up will be submitted by the Government at the next session of parliament, it is believed. Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Minister of National Defence, now in New York, doubtless will have definite suggestions ready to lay before his cabinet colleagues. While heads of the three forces—naval, militia and air—naturally are not going to announce details of plans they have worked out, military experts have recently taken the view Canada could provide reasonably adequate defence against any enemy except the United States at a cost she could afford. It will be for the cabinet to decide to what extent the plans will be carried out.

In view of the great distances an enemy would have to travel to attack either the Pacific or Atlantic coasts, an air force would be suggested that would be numerically strong enough to overpower any flotilla that could be brought across either ocean by carriers or direct flight. The plan would also provide enlargement of destroyer flotillas on both coasts to co-operate with the air force and submarines as a defence against naval attack. There is a suggestion that cruisers be added to the fleets. Coastal defence proposals also envision somewhat increased armaments along both Atlantic and Pacific shores. Under such an arrangement and with conditions of warfare as they have developed, it

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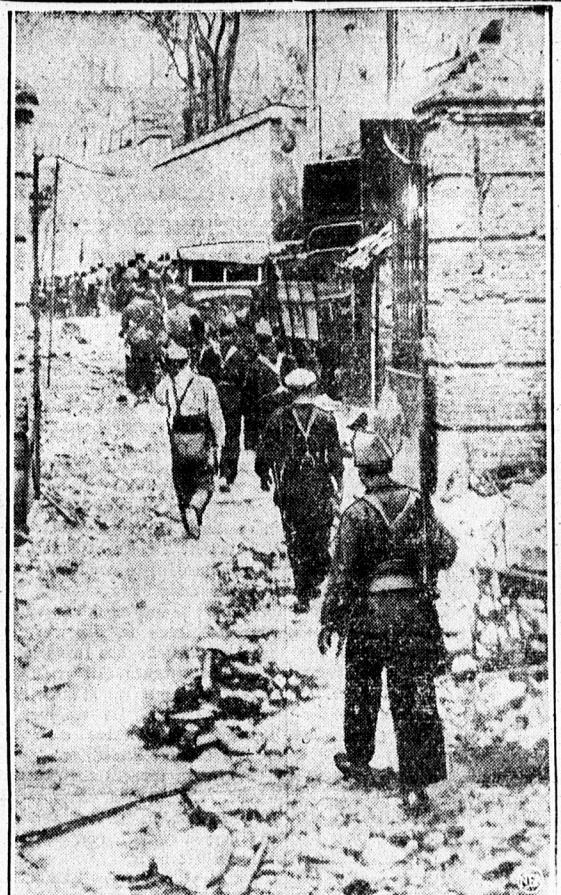
Canadian Medical Mission For Madrid

TORONTO, Oct. 21—(CP)—Dr. Bethune, Montreal surgeon, and head of the Canadian Medical Mission to Spain, conferred with Spanish Loyalist leaders here today prior to his departure for Madrid with medical and surgical supplies. "I'm only heeding the call of 1,000,000 people suffering and needing medical aid," he said. "I'm not going over for the adventure. Even though Madrid is besieged, we'll get in by airplane."

Body Of Storm Victim Found

CLEVELAND, Oct. 21—(AP)—A freighter picked up today the first body of the 19 Canadian victims who drowned when the Toronto sandboat, "Sand Merchant," rolled over and sank Saturday night in a Lake Erie storm. Walter M. Edington, shore superintendent of the "Sand Merchant," identified the body as that of Daniel Bourrie, 24, of Victoria Harbor, Ont., wheelsman. The freighter "Liberty" enroute from Conneaut, Ohio, to Detroit with a load of steel, located Bourrie's body off Fairport harbor and brought it to Cleveland. A life belt floated it, crew members said.

Navalcarnero Is Taken By Rebels Insurgent Forces Advance To Within 13 Miles Of Madrid.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) Insurgent forces captured the strategically important town of Navalcarnero, 13 miles from Madrid, last night. Navalcarnero was one of the two well-defended towns held by the Madrid forces in the immediate vicinity of the capital. The other is El Escorial, 24 miles northwest of Madrid, which the Insurgents were preparing to storm. A seven-hour aerial bombardment scattered the Government defenders of Navalcarnero, and the Insurgents moved into the town behind tanks and machine gun fire. Russia was reported ready to quit the Non-Intervention agreement and send airplanes to Madrid. A further shipment of food and clothing left Leningrad for Spain. Observers estimated the Madrid Government's 11th-hour recruiting campaign had brought 100,000 men to the colors in the past 24 hours. Women of the city staged a second demonstration in the streets, calling on non-combatant men to defend the capital. Premier Manuel Azana took over offices in the Catalan parliament building, and relief grew he would remain permanently in Barcelona. His wife has fled to France.

Plan To Complete Railway Edifice

MONTREAL, Oct. 21—(CP)—Aldermen A. E. Goyette and Joseph Moreau, appearing before an Aldermanic Committee studying expenditure of \$40,000,000 required to finish the Canadian National railways terminal here on which work has been suspended since 1934, said today the Federal Government intends to undertake completion of the project.

FORM COMMON FRONT AGAINST BOLSHEVISM

Agree to Support Fascist Military Dictatorship in Spain.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Oct. 21—(A.P.)—A new move toward welding Italo-German youth into a bulwark of European resistance against Bolshevism was announced tonight by Baldur Von Schirach, German leader of youth. In the presence of Count Galeazzo Ciano, Italian Foreign Minister, and 20,000 Hitler youths and girls. An institute for Italo-German youth leadership will be founded in Rome and Berlin, he declared at a gigantic display in the Sports Palace, for the exchange of youth leaders between the two countries. The idea of the exchange, he said, will be to familiarize young people in each country with cultural, economic and political conditions and achievements of the other as well as further cementing friendly relations between the two countries. Count Ciano, who arrived yesterday at the head of an Italian diplomatic delegation, was enthusiastically "hailed" by Nazi groups but there were no official statements on the trend of his conversations here. "I am satisfied," said the Count crisply—that was all.

Support Insurgents

ROME, Oct. 21—(A.P.)—Germany and Italy have agreed to support a Fascist-military dictatorship in Spain if the Insurgent armies triumph, it was disclosed by well-informed sources tonight. Other policies on which the two states are in accord were reported as the League of Nations, the Locarno Treaty, and the status of Central European balance of power. The developments were disclosed while Premier Mussolini's son-in-
