STENGEL'S HOMER IN NINTH GIVES GIANTS WORLD SERIES OPENER 5-4

It Was One of the Most Sensational Four Base Hits in History of the Game—Babe Ruth Gets Three Bagger But is Thrown Out at the Plate When Trying to Stretch it Into a Homer—60,000 Fans at the Game

The National League champions concentrated their attack in the fifth, when they drove Waite Hoyt from the mound, and Bush, who succeeded him, held the Giants helpless, until Casey's blow. Derby Winner and Zev Held Workout
NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Papyrus the English colt which is to race in the international derby at a mile and a half on October 29, was sent through his first real workout today at Belmont Park. With Ted Banham, the regular exercise boy in the saddle, the English colt galloped a mile and a quarter in 2:18 2/5. Although the English colt was pushed to cover the distance in good time, he appeared fatigued when it was over, according to one of the turfmen who witnessed his effort. Just before Papyrus was taken round Zev was sent out for a three furlong sprint. The Rancocas colt, just breezing, turned the three-eighths in 37. The racing followers, however, re-conceding the English horse a better chance than at first, was indicated today when a bet of \$13,000 to \$5,000 was reported placed on Zev, representing a considerable hortening of odds.
