THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 4.—Canadian egg markets are working firmer on fresh eggs with some further price advances reported from home points. Toronto.—The sale of B. C. eggs is reported to arrive here at extras 56, firsts 53, pullet extras 47, delivered. Brokers are asking for Ontario graded shipments extras 55, firsts 51, seconds 30 delivered. Montreal.—Egg receipts here today were 2,289 cases as compared to 852 cases on the corresponding day last year. The local egg market is steady with strictly fresh eggs very scarce. There is an effort being made to sell cartons of storage eggs but these are unwanted as yet. St. John.—Paying prices to country shippers have advanced sharply as supplies continue to decrease and dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs: extras 45 to 48, firsts 38 to 40, seconds 26 to 28 delivered cases returned. The turkey movement for Thanksgiving will not be heavy with prices to retailers around 30 to 35 cents per pound for selected quality. Halifax.—There is no change in the situation on this egg market over the week end with practically no receipts of fresh eggs. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 43 to 48, firsts 36 to 40, seconds 25 to 29 delivered. Storage eggs are selling to retailers at firsts 42 to 46, seconds 36 to 38. United States markets closed.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 4.—Prices on the butter market here today were 1-4 of a cent lower. Eastern townships number one pasteurized creamery butter was quoted at 29 1-4 to 19 1/2 cents a pound. A sale at 29 1-8 cents a pound was reported. Receipts were 165 boxes. The cheese market was slightly easier with Ontario quoted at 13 1/4 to 14 cents and Quebec at 13 1-4 to 13 1-2 cents a pound. Receipts totaled 5,225 boxes. The egg market was steady. Now laid eggs best quality were quoted at 53 to 55 cents, fresh firsts were 45 cents and fresh seconds 32 cents a dozen. Receipts were 2,289 cases of which the majority were American eggs passing through Montreal for export. The potato market was unchanged.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Charles Arsenault and Clifford Arsenault of Summerside were remanded to jail to be tried at the next Supreme Court by Stipendiary Magistrate, Mr. J. E. Wyatt, K. C., in the Police Court at Summerside on Tuesday morning for stealing an automobile. The case was commenced Monday afternoon. The two young men and a third boy, Henry Arsenault, were arrested between 4 and 5 o'clock on the morning of November 3rd, and charged with stealing an automobile on Sunday evening last. The evidence showed that these three boys took the auto from in front of the owner's boarding house, where he had left it while he was in the house for a few minutes, on the loss being discovered the police were notified. Proceedings to locate the car were immediately taken. After some hours of searching it was found to be abandoned by the parties near Kensington. The police have had for some time under observation. The evidence showed conclusively that the suspicions of the police were well founded. At the close of the trial on Tuesday morning Charles and Clifford were committed for trial and remanded to jail. The other boy, Henry Arsenault, being above fourteen and under sixteen was handed over to the agent for junior delinquents to be dealt with by the Judge of that Court.—S.

have a similar institution for the Maritime Provinces. The site suggested has been at Sackville, which is centrally located and will give the farmers of the three provinces an opportunity of ready access to the boys on their arrival from overseas and at the same time will give the officials control on the spot, over the placing, treatment and general progress of the boys that have been placed. While the hostel will be a United Church institution, the boys will not necessarily be all of this religious denomination. Other church organizations will be notified regularly of the arrival of boys of their particular denominations, so that the clergyman will have an opportunity of getting promptly in touch with them. The boys selected under this immigration scheme are drawn from working class families of good repute, and who are desirous of making good in Canada as agriculturists. Major Bavin and Mr. McLaren have now consulted with the provincial governments of the three Maritime Provinces, and have been assured in each case of full co-operation and support. The visitors are particularly impressed with agricultural possibilities in Prince Edward Island and are very desirous of seeing their plans work out successfully here.

HOSPITAL PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN

Grand Total Reaches \$157,918.

With a grand total of \$157,918 to date in 2,562 subscriptions after ten days of valourous effort on the part of the big volunteer corps, the \$250,000 campaign for the new Prince Edward Island Hospital is on the last lap of the magnificent marathon which 400 volunteers have run all over Kings and Queens Counties. The Victory Supper is set for next Tuesday evening, November 11, at 8 o'clock in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church. It will be served by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Hospital, as planned by Mr. Alfred Pickard, Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements. The workers consider it auspicious that the great fund raising movement is to reach its successful climax on the day that marks the triumph of civilization twelve years ago. It will be an Armistice Day for the friends of the Hospital as well as for the Dominion and all its cousins among the nations. Two hundred and forty-five new contributions were added by last night's report, which totalled \$6,487. Again it was Hooper Horne night, for the Allied Towns Committee, of which Field Marshal H. Hooper Horne is Chairman, had a larger total than all the other units combined, and the Women's Division of Charlottetown teams of which Mrs. H. Hooper Horne is Commander, reported more than three times as much as the Men's Division. That may have been because Commander Charles H. Black was in Souris with Executive Chairman W. F. Tidmarsh, helping District Chairman Roy C. McLean to round up contributions in that quarter, and High Sheriff John G. MacPadyen, who was acting Commander of the Men's Division in Commander Black's absence, had not been in the saddle long enough to make all the team captains report. Teams 3, 4 and 5, captained respectively by Mr. Malcolm MacKinnon, Mr. E. H. Beer and Mr. Wilfred F. Taylor, asked leave to withhold their reports for the evening. It is rumored that they intend to turn in handsome totals at the Victory Supper next Tuesday. The champions of the whole corps last evening were the members of Team 13, led by Mrs. Roy Quigley, with \$885 in Charlottetown subscriptions and with a courtesy credit
