The death is announced on April 1st in the United Hospital Port Chester, N. Y., of O. A. Hornsby of Havana, Cuba, who had been ill for about nine months.

Mr. Hornsby was one of the successful islanders abroad who never forgot his old home, and he with his family, spent every second summer here.

The item in the Guardian of the 25th inst., announcing the sudden death in Gloucester, Mass., of Capt. Lewis McLean, was sad news to his old friends and neighbors at Hermantown. Capt. McLean was a native of Hermantown, where he passed the first thirty years of his life, following farming and fishing previous to his moving to Gloucester (Cape Ann) nearly forty years ago. Here he pursued the fishing trade, and it was but a short time when he was entrusted with the captaincy of a fishing schooner. For a score or more years he sailed out of Cape Ann on fishing voyages to the Grand Banks, to Georges, to Greenland for cod and halibut, and to the South and down here in North Bay in pursuit of the mackerel. In his mackerel trips down here he usually made a visit to his old home at Hermantown, renewing acquaintances, leaving his vessel in the port of Soudra. His last visit was about four years ago. Captain Lewis was always warmly welcomed by his old neighbors and frequently banquets and entertainments were gotten up in his welcome. He early married in Gloucester, his wife being a Miss McKinnon, of Cardigan Road. He has a grown-up family of boys and girls in Gloucester. One sister, Mrs. Nell McPhee, Big Pond, P.E.I., survives him, though one of a date her gentle spirit winged its

homeward flight.

Capt. John McEachern, of the Settlement Board, is a nephew, her husband some twenty-seven years ago, now leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother, comprising as they did four sons and two daughters. The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Jane Henderson, was the last surviving member of a family of seven brothers and four sisters.

She took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the community.

To her home all worthy comers received a hearty welcome and no one needing aid ever called upon her in vain. In times of sickness or sorrow no one could be more solicitous to give her ease and comfort for many years she was a loyal member of the Baptist Church and in all departments of the work. Throughout her last illness she seldom or never murmured. All of her suffering was borne in a spirit of calmness and of Christian fortitude. A few hours before her death she had her favorite passage, the fourteenth chapter of the Gospel of John read for her, so that once more she might hear of that home of many mansions to which she was soon to go.

When the end came she was found ready, waiting and waiting for the Master's welcome call "Weary one come home." The valley of the shadow had no terrors for her. She knew in Whom she had believed and she was persuaded that He was able to keep what she had committed to His trust against that day. Her passing was one of calm and of deep peace.

The funeral, which was a large one, was held on the afternoon of Wednesday, March 24. The service which was a deeply solemn one, was conducted by Rev. J. W. Hayter, Rev. H. Pierce, and Rev. R. H. Staver.
