Altogether, I have been on the stage nearly two years now. THE STEAMERS.—Yesterday the Minto tried the crossing from Georgetown, leaving that port with 433 tons of freight, 20 sacks mail and 20 passengers, and at 7.30 last night was seven miles northeast of south of Panmure Island in heavy-running seas. The Earl Grey, which had left Pictou for Georgetown on Monday had not yet reached the latter port and at 7.30 was off Panmure Island cleaning her fires. She had no prospects of docking last night.

MISS BERTHA GORMAN.—Will be in her Studio on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 10 to 12 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. also in the evening. Classes are being formed in Physical Drill, Voice Culture, Public Speaking, for Men, Elocution, Folk Song, and Social Dancing and Department. Miss Gorman will also form classes for women in Physical Culture or private lessons.

ACCIDENT.—Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co. had an accident in their work shop some days ago, when their steam engine out of order. The stud holding the main bearings on the crank shaft broke and the fly wheel slipped out of position on to the floor breaking the engine considerably.

Very little delay was experienced, however, as within one hour from the time of the accident the shop was again busy, the power being supplied by two large stationary gasoline engines. The engines were repaired by the end of the week.

THE ICE BOATS.—There was no crossing at the Cape yesterday. The seven boats which were scheduled to cross did not make the attempt as there was a heavy northeast wind blowing and with two miles of open water it would hardly be possible to control the boats. This was also the cause of the six ice boats from Cape Tarentine not getting out to sea. To-day the boats will try the crossing if the wind is favorable. Otherwise they cannot cross. The mail special which had been at the Cape returned to the city at 8.45, with mail for the Island.

The special which went to Georgetown with the steamers remained there yesterday and will return to the city when the steamer docks.

LONG COURSE.—On Tuesday evening the period usually taken for debate by the Long Course Lecture was occupied with discussion. Mr. W. M. Cann took up the feeding of beef cattle and strongly advertised having the caves come in the autumn or early winter, pointing out that there was plenty of time to care for them and they went out on the grass in the spring able to make the best use of the good summer feed. He advocated hand feeding of the calves rather than allowing them to suck, as they could be raised very much cheaper. The most important things in connection with calf feeding, were to have everything clean and not allow the calves to get an over gorge of milk. We should begin to feed 10 lbs of milk a day and increase to 20 lbs, if we had plenty of milk not to feed more. The calves should be taught to eat hay and grain as early as possible. As year olds they could be wintered cheaper on roots, straw, and clover hay and a small ration of meal. The second matter put on good grass they would make splendid progress and should be finished for the market either at Christmas or Easter. He advocated dehorning steers as they fed better and were much nicer to handle. Quite a number of questions were asked by the students which brought out the best methods of feeding growing cattle. Eric Dohle then led the discussion on the feeding and management of hens. He pointed out the importance of the poultry industry and then briefly outlined the house that was considered the most practicable in this Province. He spoke on the work he was doing now in connection with the long course in feeding about a dozen hens. They were pullets of the Barred Rock breed purchased in the autumn and removed to the agricultural hall under not the most favorable conditions. He had however, succeeded in having them start laying and had done well until the recent cold snap when he was only able to get one or two a day. These last couple of days however, they had laid 4 and 5 a day and he thought they would soon be up to their old standard. He thought there was much profit in the feeding of hens for winter egg production and suggested that the next subject for debate should be "Resolved that the poultry industry is quite as profitable a business in this Province as dairying."

EXECUTIVE MEETING.—A meeting of the Executive Council was held yesterday afternoon. The principal business taken up was the completion of arrangements for the coming session of the Legislature.

INVESTIGATION.—An investigation is being held to ascertain who was responsible for the recent railway accident at Coleman Station. This will likely have to be dealt with by the General Superintendent at Moncton.

CONFEDERATION COMMITTEE.—There was a meeting of the Confederation Committee in the Provincial Building last evening when it was decided to suggest to the Governor General that the Confederation Celebration might be held during three days of the next week in August, next, conditional upon his convenience. About thirty letters were written to parties throughout the country inviting exhibits illustrative of the Island's industries on the occasion. This was all the business discussed at the meeting, which adjourned sine die.

FOR CIVILIAN RIFLEMEN.—With reference to the paragraph that appeared in The Guardian several days ago regarding the proposals of the Militia Council towards the greater encouragement of rifle shooting among members of civilian rifle associations throughout the Dominion, it may be explained that each regiment and efficient association the offer of a special prize of a nickel silver ornamented salver will be made. The prize is to be an individual prize, and is to be known as The Dominion of Canada Prize. Each salver will be ten inches in diameter, bearing the coat-of-arms of Canada. Competitors must be duly enrolled members of the association they represent, as shown by the last service roll on file at headquarters. As stated before, to be eligible for this prize, it will be necessary for the association to hold four competitions during 1914, and the dates of these competitions must be filed in advance at a general meeting of the association and communicated to the officer commanding the Division or District before the first shoot for the salver. The ranges at which these competitions are to take place will be 200, 300 and 600 yards, and the targets will be as specified in regulations for rifle associations, with scoring in each range to count. The prize will be awarded to the competitor making the highest aggregate in the four competitions. Competitors will have to use the arms and ammunition provided by the Government as free issue for the year.

HOW TO BE HEALTHY.—In addition to the other privileges of the Household and Short Course the students receive instructive lectures from Dr. A. Ross. "How to keep Healthy" was one of the most practical advice was given, including the necessity of sunshine and fresh air conditions which interfere with the proper amount of each for sound health. The importance of other influences was emphasized, such as exercise, sleep, the proper combination of well-cooked meats, a regular amount of water in the diet, the teeth, as an aid to digestion, and cleanliness of the body. Stress was laid on the harmful influences caused by worry; imagination, the use of the common drinking cup, and of violation of nature's laws, which sooner or later must be atoned for.

The second lecture "Common Sense Methods in Care of the Sick," the doctor explained in a very interesting way how disease germs attack the body and the fight that is put up when the blood is in sound healthy condition. Then he described the home treatment in the care of the more common and less serious kinds of sickness. Both of these lectures were of much practical value and were listened with interested attention. The students are deeply indebted to Dr. Ross for his kindness and the trouble taken to instruct them in Hygiene, a subject with which he is so capable of dealing.
