P. G. Wodehouse's "Jeeves" At Prince Edward

With a "want-no" and a "cheerio," Jeeves, P. G. Wodehouse's maricous "gentleman's gent," who knows all about women, returns to the screen for the first time in the new picture, "Thank You, Jeeves," opening yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Droll Arthur Treacher plays the poker-faced valet, with Virginia Field the "mad" in distress, and David Niven as the blundering, butter-fingered Bertie Wooster. A typical Wodehouse tale, made funnier than ever by its transition to the screen, "Thank You, Jeeves" is one of the most riotous of Jeeves' adventures in extricating the insane Bertie from a peck of trouble and helping him win the lady of his heart.

The picture opens in the apartment of Bertie Wooster, Wodehouse's amiable crackpot, with Bertie banging away with great zeal and little rhythm at a set of drums. Jeeves is a pained critic of his master's new aberration.

Jeeves gives notice: what with drumming, banjole playing and romancing in various knife-throwing countries, Bertie's escapades have frayed even the iron Jeeves' nerves. As they talk, the doorbell rings and a beautiful young girl asks admiringly for Mr. Bertie Wooster.

Neither Bertie nor Jeeves has ever seen the girl before, but Bertie welcomes her over Jeeves' stony disapproval.

From the girl's speech, Bertie gathers that she is an international adventuress, with the police hot on her trail. When she leaves, Bertie and the despairing Jeeves follow.

True to form, Bertie has managed to garble everything and it remains for the imperturbable Jeeves to straighten matters out, which he does in a wildly hilarious series of mad adventures.

film drama, "The Last Outlaw," which opened to an enthusiastic audience at the Capitol Theatre yesterday.

Harry Carey, the perennial cowboy hero of the screen, portrays a frontier desperado who is released from prison after a twenty-five year term for bank robbery.

Carey, co-starred with Hoot Gibson, is supported by such notable western stars as Henry B. Walthall, one of the real veterans of the screen, and Tom Tyler, a New Yorker who made good as a Hollywood cowboy. Margaret Callahan has the feminine lead.

Carey, unable to orient himself following his prison release in a modern world of machines and speed, looks up his old friend, the sheriff, played by Walthall.

When a modern gang kidnaps Miss Callahan, Carey joins forces with the sheriff and her admirer, Gibson, in bringing the gang to justice.

The lovely Miss Callahan lends a refreshing touch to the picture as a modern girl whose affections lean toward Gibson, a young rancher.

Director Christy Cabanne handled the film deftly, giving it a breezy pace, timing his action and comedy adroitly, and bringing it to a thrilling climax.

A new cowboy song by Nathaniel Shilkret and Frank Luther and sung by the popular radio baritone Fred Scott is one of the highlights.
