"Pontiac" Features Four New Cars

OSHAWA. —To reduce change-over interruption to a minimum and get new cars to the waiting list of purchasers with the least delay, major changes in the 1947 Pontiac have been confined to appearance and design refinements. General Motors said today in releasing details of the new models.

Pontiac will feature four series of cars in 1947—the Fleetleader and Fleetleader Special in the low-price field, and the Torpedo and Streamliner with either six or eight cylinders. On all four series, the approach-pattern gains in beauty and massiveness through simplification of the front grille. Four heavy horizontal chrome-plated and polished radiator grilles give the Pontiac front a broad, workmanlike sweep. New parking lamps are recessed into the grille below the headlights. Outlining the grille top is a symmetrical, heavily-chromed moulding incorporating a centre name plate. This bears the Pontiac Indian Head and is set off by a narrow black enamel band.

The Fleetleader and Fleetleader Special, each on a 116-inch wheelbase, have the sturdy box-body type of frame which provides exceptional resistance to distortion. The Fleetleader Series is available in a two-door sedan, four-door sedan, business coupe, and sport coupe, and the Fleetleader Special Series in a two-door sedan, four-door sedan, sedan coupe and sport coupe. On the Fleetleader Special many advanced details add to the luxurious appointments.

The Torpedo on the 119-inch chassis and the 122-inch wheelbase Streamliner are built to house either the Six-cylinder or Eight-cylinder engine. Vastum motorization has been added to the eight-cylinder engine, giving better performance with low octane fuel.

Body styles for 1947 are: Torpedo—2-door sedan, 4-door sedan, sedan coupe, convertible coupe and sport coupe in the Streamliner Series—2-door sedan, 4-door sedan, and the Standard and Deluxe Station Wagon. Interior appearance in the Streamliner Series breaks with the traditional instrument panel and window moulding lower panels in solid colors. These surfaces are painted Berwick Beige and impart a soft and window garnish mouldings are finished in Autumn Brown. The instrument cluster is redesigned with large, circular speedometer dial, edge-lighted and easily read. In Torpedo, instrument panel, door panels and window mouldings are finished in Circean Walnut.

On both the Torpedo and Streamliner, heavy wrap-around bumpers introduced by Pontiac last year, again add to safety and appearance.

Predicts Influx Of Immigrants Within 5 Years

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 — (CP) — Revenue Minister McConn has predicted that "when we do embark on a definite long-term immigration policy and implement it, it will mean an influx into Canada of thousands, and that will probably be within the next five years."

The lone medical man in the federal cabinet told the first annual dinner of the Ottawa Academy of Medicine last night that the Government "has not yet formulated a policy in regard to immigration, but I can say that the matter is being studied and given the closest consideration."

The text of his address to a closed meeting, obtained today, showed that he added: "In any policy to be formed on immigration, the complexion of our present population should not materially change. We are being pressed by individuals, groups and agencies, both in our country and in foreign lands, to grant entry into Canada, but there would not appear to be urgency on our part until we can take care of our own housing problem is not yet solved and surely it is not a kindness to bring people into Canada until they can get housing accommodation."

He said that since VJ-day 75,000 newcomers had entered Canada in foreign lands, to grant entry to displaced persons and farm laborers, such as the former Polish soldiers.

In view of the prospects of a long-term immigration policy, he asked: "Will we have the doctors, nurses, social service workers or institutions to meet their (immigrants) needs in case of illness?" That will be the task of our profession as well as that of the state."

Huge Wheat Shipment To United Kingdom

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 — (CP) — Trade Minister MacKinnon told the Commons today that in the first six months of this crop year Canada shipped the equivalent of 72,000,000 bushels of wheat to the United Kingdom.

He said that under the terms of the four-year contract with the United Kingdom Canada was to ship 150,000,000 bushels to Britain this year. From Aug. 1 to the end of last month 57,000,000 bushels had been converted into flour and sent to Britain.

In addition some 20,000,000 bushels of wheat had been sent to countries other than the United Kingdom. The price from Britain was fixed at \$1.55 under the contract. The prices on sales to other countries ranged from \$2.05 to \$2.27-1/2.

He spoke before the house adopted a resolution to a bill that will give the Canadian wheat board the power to operate at least until 1950 when the contract with the United Kingdom expires.

While he spoke Hon. John Strachey, British Food Minister, looked on from the diplomatic gallery. Mr. Strachey arrived in Ottawa during the day to discuss means of speeding the delivery of Canadian food supplies overseas.

ing. No there was lots a' lots of words along the road. Wasn't that funny? Granddaddy said so this morning. James and Jamie had gone very thoroughly into these matters. Inspired likely by that wonder book of knowledge: Meacham's Atlas of The Island (1880), a respected inheritance of ours from James' forebears.

It is a broad—and somewhat battered volume but nonetheless interesting and often referred to in answer to someone's query as to "How many acres are in that farm?" James can find out at once. Scarcely past yesterday's light of dawn, it was propped against two pairs of knees, when I called on the train in the old bed, on my way to the kitchen. "Look here now, Jamie, at the old registers in the fields," James was saying, "wouldn't they look funny now?" And look at these men taking in hay in a cart—what a slow way that must have been, Ellen! but that must be, for the times. And here, Jamie is your farm home. Do you see the brook running through it here? Jamie saw it clearly and I too lingered there, leaning over a shoulder to catch a nearer view of the bonneting illustrations and portraits, so quaint now, in the light of these modern days. Quaint, picturesque and the home-steads, in appearance so homely and lacking as though speaking to posterity, their builders said: "I built this place strong and true. From hand hewn beams and rafters, fashioning it as best I knew, to shelter my family. You of our line, know well our traditions — that you continue them." And while some of the farms are occupied by those of the name, others have gone to strange hands, or with long disuse the buildings have gone to decay or are lost altogether in the changing pages of the past.

More than any course offered, the Industrial Arts options have proved those boys of our school whose formal education will terminate with High School Graduation, with something that has made school for them a place of interest and a source of value. These courses which have been far more highly differentiated in recent years have furnished the means to meet the needs of a group of students that formerly dropped out of high school because of discouragement and a sense of defeat.

The sole reason for my presence here today is to outline to this gathering what has resulted in the actual practice from the deliberations of the British Columbia educational philosophers of a decade or more ago. I hope that I will not appear presumptuous in my assertion that we have tried out many of their suggestions and have found them good. In my opinion the success or failure of these experiments will, in the long run, depend upon the measure of interest which the teacher is able to stimulate in the student. This, of course, in turn depends upon two vital factors, the enthusiasm, scholarship and personality of the teacher and the subject matter of instruction.

Whether are we tending? Reports are current that further revision is in prospect. I hope with confidence, that those in charge of our educational affairs will use sanctified common sense in whatever they undertake. This reminds me of a famous historian about a century ago: "Everywhere there is a class of men who cling with fondness to whatever is ancient and who, even where convinced by overpowering reasons, that innovation would be beneficial, consent to it with many misgivings and forebodings. We find, also, everywhere, another class of men sanguine in hope, bold in speculation, always pressing forward, quick to discern the imperfections of whatever exists, disposed to think lightly of the risks and inconveniences which attend improvements, and disposed to give every change credit for being an

Red apples are attractive if steamed until tender, then peeled, chilled and served with top milk or custard sauce.

Someone mentioned pancakes, the other day, and immediately a vision arose of a stack of golden brown griddle cakes with maple syrup or corn syrup, which many persons prefer—oozing down the sides.

Here's an old-fashioned pancake recipe which still is a favorite with many a Canadian family: one cup white flour, one cup bran flour, one-half teaspoon soda, 1 3/4 cups buttermilk (or sour milk), one-half teaspoon salt, four tablespoons melted shortening, two eggs (well-beaten).

Mix dry ingredients. Add milk to beaten eggs, and add dry ingredients.
