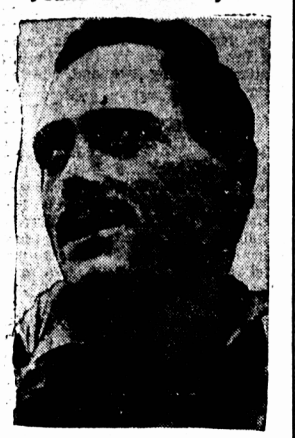

Joint Political Meeting Held Last Night At Souris

The only joint meeting of the July 15 by-election campaign in the First district, held at Souris Theatre last night, with the candidates, Messrs. Brenton St. John and Melvin J. McQuaid the chief speakers. Mr. John D. MacIntyre, Souris, was chairman.

Mr. McQuaid, the Progressive Conservative candidate was supported in short talks by Major John A. MacDonald, Dr. A.A. MacDonald and Mr. John R. MacLean, M.L.A.

Speaking on behalf of the Liberal candidate, Mr. St. John, were Mr. T.J. Kichham, Federal member for King's, whose resignation to contest the Federal election, left the seat in First King's vacant, and Messrs. Francis White, George Saville, M.L.A., and Joseph Campbell, M.L.A.

The audience about half-filled the theatre.

Mr. McQuaid stressed the need of opposition to keep a check rein on the Government which has a strong majority in the Legislature. He stated that the district would not be deprived of any benefits if it were represented by two representatives (the other representative being the Conservative member Mr. John MacLean). He refrained from criticizing the Liberal policies and pledged himself to work in the interest of the district.

Mr. St. John stated that it would not benefit the district to elect another Conservative member to the Legislature. He outlined several Liberal policies, stating that \$600,000 in children's allowances were annually spent in King's County and describing the increase in amounts of old age pensions made under the Liberal Government.

Major MacDonald dealt chiefly with the financial situation of the Province. He stated that the Government is incurring debt due to heavy expenditures but that under-expenditures were made during the past year on agriculture and education. One reason he gave

Appointed To Experimental Station Staff

Mr. Graeme W. Boswell, M.Sc. (Agr. Chem.) has been appointed to the staff of the Experimental Station at Charlottetown, Mr. R.C. Parent, Superintendent informed the Guardian yesterday.

Born at French Fort, Mr. Boswell is a son of Mrs. Boswell and Mr. J. Boswell, a well-known farmer who will be employed as a soil specialist in charge of soil fertility experiments, particularly those being planned for the Beech Grove Inn farm.

He will be working in close cooperation with Mr. D.C. Schurman, assistant to the superintendent in Field Husbandry and Mr. George Whitehead, soil specialist in charge of Soil Survey and co-operative soil fertility experiments.

Mr. Parent points out that the maintenance of soil fertility is the basic and major agricultural problem in P.E. Island. Mr. Boswell's appointment will increase the range of experiments and it is expected that more equipment will be added to the soil laboratories.

In 1942, from Dunstaffnage school, Mr. Boswell entered Prince of Wales College on a B.S. Scholarship. Graduating in 1945, he received the Franklin Boyer scholarship to Acadia University from which he graduated in science in 1947. That fall Mr. Boswell entered the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research of McGill University and received his M.Sc. (Agr. Chem.) last May.

During the three summers of 1945-47 he was employed at the Experimental Farm, at Charlottetown. While at McGill, he was employed by the Dominion Department of Agriculture as graduate assistant in Soil Research at Macdonald College. The results of this work formed the basis of his master's thesis which was entitled "An Investigation of the Acidity of Leaches from Decomposing Leaves of Deciduous Trees."

Mr. Boswell has been employed for the past eight months as chemist in the development laboratories of the Dominion Oilseed and Linoleum Company, Montreal.

Weather Favorable For Potato Crop

The meteorological factors—precipitation, temperature, and humidity—for the first two weeks of July have not been favourable to late blight disease, and it is anticipated that this malady will make its appearance much later than in 1948, when outbreaks were observed in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick on July 26. A potato growers advisory service, issued by the Laboratory of Plant Pathology at Charlottetown, said yesterday, "Colorado beetle larvae are causing some damage to potatoes in many early planted fields. DDT 50% wettable powder, used at the rate of 2 pounds to 100 gallons of water or a 3% DDT dust will keep them under control."
