

REVIEWS WORK AT MEETING OF COUNCIL

Coun. E. A. Foster Reviews Activities of His Department.

The following report, concerning work carried on in his department during the past year was read by Coun. E. A. Foster, chairman of the Public Property Committee, at the annual meeting of the City Council Thursday night.

Public Property Department—Unemployment Relief

During 1937 the stone retaining wall about Government Pond was completed, as was also a timber face and repairs to the East side of Pownall Wharf in connection with Lord's Wharf project.

The concrete breastwork at the East End Bathing Houses having become undermined, due to the action of ice and salt water, was replaced for a length of 114 feet.

The fire escapes on the Market building were also repaired and the weights were replaced eliminating the danger to persons who might tamper with them.

Total quantity of City permanent works as at end of December, 1937:

- Storm water sewers 53,255 lineal feet or 10,911 miles. Concrete sidewalks 146,096.1 lineal feet or 27.9 miles.

- Concrete curb and gutter 148,829.9 lineal feet or 28.1 miles. Concrete base for improved streets 183,616.1 square yards.

- Black macadam improved streets 60,487.9 square yards. Asphalt wearing surface 214,229.9 square yards or 16,656 miles.

- Concrete base, curb and gutter, resturants 4,314 square yards or 0.31 miles. Water bound Macadam 1623 lineal feet or 307 miles.

- Gravel streets 9,221.7 square yards or 7.31 miles.

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STREET WORK REVIEWED BY COMMITTEE

On Great George and Grafton front and side of Capitol Theatre. This work was done under contract by Charles W. Grafton and comprises a total of 1809.9 square yards of cement work.

Street Maintenance: During the year 1937, labor and material in connection with street maintenance have cost the city a total of \$4,573.50.

Paving Projects—Unemployment Relief: The following projects were completed in the city of Charlottetown during the year 1937.

Clay Streets: The clay streets throughout the city were kept in good condition by scarifying, grading and rolling.

Gravel Streets: Those streets were also kept in good condition by scarifying, grading and rolling.

Asphalt Surfaced Streets: Necessary repairs to the streets were carried out by the Standard Paving Company and by the city workmen.

Concrete Sidewalks: Extensive repairs were made to concrete sidewalks by the city workmen, cracked and broken slabs being replaced where it was necessary to do so.

Special Work—Unemployment Relief: Concrete slabs were laid between the sidewalks and curb in the following places:

On the East side of Queen Street from Kent to Grafton. On the West side of Queen Street between Water and King.

On the West side of Queen Street between Kent and Grafton. On the North side of Grafton from Queen to Great George.

On the North side of Kent Street between Queen and Great George Streets. On the East side of Prince Street from Richmond to Sydney.

Park Terrace West side from Brighton Road to York Lane. Elm Ave West side from Longwood Street to Great George.

Greenfield Ave East side a distance of 178 feet north from Green Street. This comprises 2675.7 lineal feet at a total cost of \$3,573.50.
