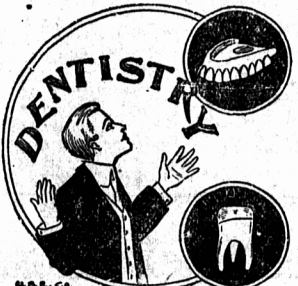

EARL GREY.—The Earl Grey left Pictou at 7 a. m., for Charlottetown and docked about eleven with 25 passengers, 2 1/2 tons of freight, express and 175 sacks of letter and paper mail. She leaves on return to Pictou tomorrow morning.

PAPER RECEIVED.—The Guardian has received from James Pendergast, Francis, Sask., formerly of this province, a copy of the Regina Daily Province containing an account of a recent curling match in which a Charlottetonian played, as reported elsewhere. In the same edition is an excellent sermon by Rev. M. A. McKinnon, whose name is a familiar one to many, on "Playing The Game" from 11 Samuel 10-12. This service was largely attended by the curlers taking part in the bonspiel.

SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The half-yearly examination of Hunter River School was held on Monday, Dec. 23rd, with a large number of visitors present. The pupils were examined in the various branches by Misses Ella Martin and Gertrude McAulay, and Elmer McLeod, student of the P. W. C., and it was clearly shown from their quick and intelligent answers to the questions given, they were carefully and accurately taught. The ratifiers expressed themselves as well satisfied with the work done by the teacher, Miss Leonard. A good program was also rendered, John Rackham acting as chairman. The pupils were treated to candy by the teacher, but they did not fail to appreciate the services of their teacher, for at the close of the examination Olive Doucine on behalf of the pupils presented her with an address accompanied by a nice present. The teacher suitably replied and thanked them for their kind remembrance.

GOOD GAME.—The bonspiel commenced in Regina on Jan. 9th, it is scheduled to finish on Jan 18th. Curlers come from all over the province to Saskatoon and some come from Manitoba. The ratifiers, Mr. Ronshan, formerly of Charlottetown, a nephew of Chief Ronshan, is one of the four men on the famous Hick's rink of Napinka, Man. They have competed in six games, and have not yet tasted defeat. Great interest is taken in the curling game there. There is one large curling rink, containing ten individual rinks, which makes eighty men engaged at the "roarin' game" when all rinks are engaged at once. They start at eight o'clock a. m. and they are going up till eleven o'clock, p. m. It is apparent that the trophies are won by elimination contests, the winners are pitted against one another, till the best wins. The winter has been exceptionally mild in Francis, Sask., till January, says the writer, when some harder weather is being dealt out. The snowfall is light, not yet covering the stubble in the field.
