The number of teachers employed is as follows:—

The amount paid as Supplements to teachers' salaries for the year was \$23,477.00 less deductions for City Teachers' Pension System \$63,450 and War Tax \$60.80, or \$28,731.70 net.

At the entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College, Miss Ann S. Duffy, pupil of Prince Street School, made the highest number of marks in the City and, as usual in such a case, was awarded a prize of \$15.00 by the Board.

During the summer vacation not only was there a considerable amount of interior decorating done in the four schools but the roof of the annex of Prince Street School, which was leaking badly, was replaced. The roof on the Janitor's house at West Kent School, which was leaking, was covered with fire-proof shingles, as was also the east side of the roof of the Janitor's house at Prince Street School.

As there has always been trouble in heating the annex of Prince Street School some changes were made by moving some of the radiators from the old building to the annex and installing one or two new ones. In connection with the same difficulty all the windows in the annex were weather-stripped. The windows of one room on the top floor of the old building were similarly treated.

All these repairs were paid for out of current revenue and no debentures were issued by the Board during the year.

Manual Training was carried on during the year with excellent instructors in both West Kent and Queen Square Schools, and we believe with splendid results. At the former school some 228 boys received instruction under Mr. LeBaron E. Tall and at Queen Square School about 214 boys received similar instruction from Mr. Percy Barlow. The boys attending these classes are greatly interested and their work should prove invaluable to them in later life.

During April and May and from September 31st to October 31st girls from Prince Street and West Kent Schools received instruction in practical Domestic Science in the kitchen of Prince of Wales College.

During the latter term 70 girls from Prince Street School received instruction under the direction of Miss Muriel Weeks and 66 girls from West Kent School under the direction of Miss Bessie Prowse. During the two periods mentioned 132 girls from Rochford Square School received similar instruction in the kitchen of that school from one of the teachers. The girls from the three schools seem to be greatly interested in this work.

During the year several of our teachers were granted leave of absence on account of being called for military service. From West Kent School Mr. Ernest D. Reid from Queen Square School Acting Principal J. W. P. McCallum and Acting Vice-Principal Alfred P. Doucette (the latter later resigned) and from Prince Street School Miss Muriel Weeks.

In June Mr. J. W. Boulter was reappointed a member of the Board by the Government and Mr. H. F. MacPhee was reappointed a member of the Board by the City.

We regret that our expenditures exceeded our income but, owing to the war and remembering the difficulty of getting coal during the previous winter, acting on the advice of those who understand the coal situation, the Board decided to fill the coal bins and we therefore spent \$1277.29 more for coal than we had estimated at the beginning of the year. In former years it would have been necessary to purchase coal in January, we now have sufficient to last until at least late in the Spring.

Rangers Defeat Leafs 7-2 And Tie For League Lead

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Before the largest crowd to see a hockey game in Madison Square Garden this season, 16,121 paid admissions, the powerful New York Rangers defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 7-2 and advanced into a tie for first place in the National League standing with the defeated Boston Bruins.

Returning to action after a week's lay-off, the Rangers' outplayed the Leafs for a four-goal lead in the second period and then outscored them 3-2 in the final 20 minutes during which the over-anxious Leafs were frequently trapped by the fast Ranger forwards.

The Toronto team, tired after a strenuous game with Boston on Saturday, and lacking the services of Wally Stanowski, Bob Davidson and Neck Metz, but with injuries was no match tonight for the Rangers, the hottest club in hockey. Rangers now have the enviable record of 11 wins against one draw and one loss in their last 13 games starting Christmas night.

Lynn Patrick the league's leading scorer, snared two of the second period goals to boost his total to 19, while the other New York tallies were spread around. Mac Colville, Alex Shibicky, Bryan Hextall and Bill Juzda and Alf Pike each getting one. For Toronto, the marksmen who prevented goalie Jim Henry from getting his

coveted first major league shutout were both defencemen, Bucko McDonald and Bingo Kampman the second, backhanded home a low 30-foot shot.

The game marked the 84th time in succession that Rangers have not been shut out. A feature of their play was the number of points earned by defencemen, with Babe Pratt making plays for three goals. Neil Colville for two and Juzda for one.

Bruins defeat Play 12 matches Maple Leafs 3-2 In week-end Bcnspiel here

TORONTO, Feb. 1.—(CP)—Perched alone atop the National Hockey League ladder, Boston Bruins today faced the prospect of being dethroned by the Leafs.

The Bruins gained undisputed leadership when they downed the third-place Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 in overtime here Saturday in what might prove to be Clapper's last stand. The big, likeable defenceman who will be 35 next week, was seriously injured in the third period.

The Achilles tendon of Clapper's left leg was severely cut by a skate when he collided with Bingo Kampman behind the Boston net in the third period while the Bruins were short-handed. The Achilles tendon controls movement of the heel.

Dr. R. J. Galloway, Toronto club physician, said the tendon was severed but held together by muscle. It will be probably six weeks before Clapper will be able to attempt to skate.

With today's contest here, the only one scheduled in the league, Aces consolidated their grip on second place and remained four points behind the league-leading Ottawa Senators who outscored Cornwall 6-3 Saturday.

Lowly Americans Whip Injury-riddled Bruins 2-1

BOSTON, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The injury-riddled Boston Bruins dropped to a tie for the National Hockey League lead with New York Rangers by permitting the lowly Brooklyn Americans to overtake them for a 2-1 triumph before a skippy crowd of 8,500 tonight at the Boston Garden.

Although the Americans, who also were unable to dress more than 13 players, had only five shots at goalie Frankie Brimsek, they managed to end the second period in a 1-1 deadlock, thanks to the 30 stops made by Charlie Rayner during the first 40 minutes.

About halfway through the finale, the aggressive Pat Egan tied in the winning goal from the Boston blue line, after taking a puck batted back to him as two Bruins tried to corner Ken Mosdell when he hit the defence just in time to take a pass from Mel Hill.

Mosdell also gained an assist on the American's first goal, for he passed out of the right corner to Bill Summerhill, who blasted a five-footer through Brimsek during the 15th minute of the second period.

The Bruins' only success followed the Americans' first rush of the game, which Buzz Boll made after 12 minutes of one-sided action. Buzz got in close enough to test the Boston goalie from the edge of his crease and his rebound bounced out to Flash Hollett, who raced the length of the rink and beat Rayner with a point blank shot.

Canadiens win 3-2 over Chicago

CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The last-place Montreal Canadiens defeated the fourth-place Chicago Black Hawks tonight, 3-2, in a National Hockey League game before 14,057 spectators in the Chicago Stadium. Red Hamill of the Canadiens was the first period winner, giving major and match misconduct penalties.

The teams were tied 1-1 at the end of the first period and 2-2 at the close of the second. The winning tally was made at 17:15 of the final frame when Charley Sands, of Montreal, beat goalie Sam Lo Presti, of the Hawks, following a rink-long dash by Ray Gettiffe.

Hamill's dismissal from the ice was the result of a clash between the Chicago red-head and Gerry Heffernan of the Canadiens. There had been considerable unnecessary jostling among the players all through the early part of the game and the Hamill-Heffernan joust was the first open outbreak of strife.

The Canadiens were ahead at the time, 1-0, but with each side a

count on Bob Carse's goal. Joe Benoit put Montreal in front in the second period but Cully Dahlstrom's score for Chicago made it 2-2 before the second intermission.

With Bill Carse and Doug Benoit of the Hawks ailing and Hamill banned, the Chicagoans operated with only 13 players the greater part of the game.
