Town of Kensington Annual Report

The annual report of the Town of Kensington was submitted at a public meeting held in the Council Chamber on Friday evening, Jan. 19th ult.

The Mayor in his admirable address gave a general outline of the business transactions of the past year. He stressed the importance of providing more and better fire protection.

Councillor Kennedy, chairman of the Finance Committee presented in full the financial statement for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31st, 1922.

Councillor McParlane, chairman of the Fire Department, gave a detailed report of his department. The sum of \$1491.20 was expended, which amount included the purchase of a motor truck.

Councillor Baker, chairman of Sidewalk Committee, reported having laid government sidewalks on the Margate Road Street, and on Broadway Street from Hartle to C. M. B. A. Hall, besides crossings.

Councillor Simpson, chairman of Street Committee reported an expenditure of \$381.75. The Malpeque, Margate and Summer'side roads had been graded in a sloped manner to the Road Project.

Councillor Dunahue, chairman of Light Committee, reported a greater improvement in the lights as compared with last year.

Councillor Walker, chairman of Police Property Committee, reported having the Town Hall painted inside and outside.

Remarks relative to the work of the various departments were then made by ex-Mayor Jardine, John McEwen, J. M. Laird, C. C. Cooke, K. L. Waite, D. P. Casey and J. B. Profit.

The eighth year for the co-operative marketing by the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association of the wool clip for the patrons who wish to avail themselves of this system for disposing of their wool was in every way satisfactory.

The year 1922 showed a slight increase in the number of wool received. The total quantity amounted to practically 36,000 lbs. An increase over 1921 of 6,000 lbs. There was a higher percentage of good wool last year than in the previous year.

ARREST OF GERMAN INDUSTRIALS CAUSES QUANDARY IN BERLIN

Payment of Fines Would be Admission of French Jurisdiction; Refusal Would Mean More Seizures by French. Paris Demands More Drastic Measures in Ruhr and Complete Isolation of District From Rest of Germany May be Ordered.

(Special to The Guardian.) BERLIN, Jan. 25.—The French military court in May in the Ruhr has failed. Parliament has put the government in a quandary. If the fines are paid the Germans recognize French jurisdiction in the newly occupied territory.

PARIS, Jan. 25.—According to the Parisian military operations in the Ruhr are being virtually ended and the Allied authorities are beginning to consider the question of instituting a zone of control there civil and military. 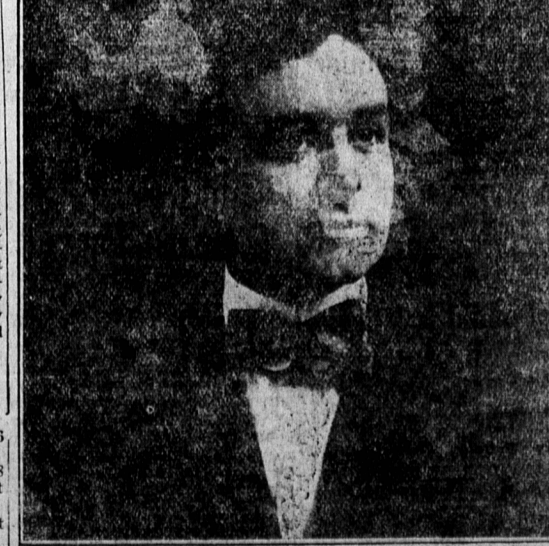
Coming Budget Causes Speculation

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Jan. 25.—The Budget will this session again be the piece de resistance in the government's parliamentary program. The reasons given by Mr. Fielding last year for failure to reduce the general tariff to any extent stand as good today as they did last session. While providing for slight increases in the British preferences on a wide range of commodities ranging from 2 1/2 percent, Mr. Fielding declared that while the present American tariff remained as it was it would be folly for Canada to make any reductions in the general tariff by which the United States should benefit.
