THE WEEK, OCTOBER 10-17.

Within the seven days covered by today's issue of the WEEKLY GUARDIAN some important events have occurred. In the home field the one master of most engrossing interest was the inquiry publicly conducted by Messrs Rogers, Conroy and McEachern as Commissioners into the management and condition of the Lunatic Hospital. The taking of evidence was begun at Falconwood on Tuesday 10th instant and was concluded on Friday 13th at the Colonial Building, Charlottetown. The evidence and an abstract of the preliminary report of the Commissioners have appeared in the columns.

During the week a crisis was reached in the long-pending difficulty between Great Britain and the Transvaal. On the 10th the Transvaal government unexpectedly issued an ultimatum demanding the retirement of the British forces from the border, the withdrawal of all forces sent to Cape Colony or Natal since 1st June last and the immediate return of any troops then on their way to South Africa. Wednesday at 5 o'clock p. m. was fixed as the date for a definite answer, and failing the receipt of a satisfactory reply it was announced would be considered by the Boer Republic as a declaration of war. The British Government declined to discuss or answer the insolent demand, and on Thursday the Transvaal Government declared war against Great Britain.

The declaration of war was immediately followed by the invasion of Natal and Cape Colony by Boer forces from both the Transvaal and the Orange Free State. Railway trains were attacked and telegraph lines cut. On Friday an armored train on the railway between Kimberly and Mafeking carrying British troops was derailed by the Boers who attacked it with artillery killing 13 men and capturing two guns.

Public feeling in Canada was profoundly stirred by these events with the result that the Canadian Government decided to call for 1,000 volunteers and despatch them by special steamer to South Africa. It was first announced that the Steamer Sardinian had been chartered to transport the Canadian contingent and would sail from Quebec on 31st October. Later it was decided to expedite matters and announced that the Sardinian will sail on the 24th. In the meantime the District Officers Commanding have received orders to call for volunteers, and are at this writing meeting with a loyal response. The latest tidings from the seat of war indicate that the British forces have not yet taken the offensive and that the Boers are occupying British soil at various points along the southern and western borders of the Transvaal and Orange Free State. They have surrounded the most important city of Kimberly, and

have invested Vryburg and Mafeking on the west and occupied small towns and villages on the south of their territory.

A week ago there had been several ineffectual attempts to bring off the projected yacht race for the America Cup and though no race had been completed British and Canadian hopes had been raised by the performance of the Shamrock. Monday's race, the first that was actually completed, dashed these hopes to the ground. Tuesday's race also went in favor of the American yacht, which appears to have quite out-footed the Shamrock before the latter met with the accident which put her out of the race. It now seems almost certain that the cup will remain on this side the Atlantic until a future contest at least.

In the national and political world the events of the week have been the visit of Premier Laurier to Chicago to assist President McKinley at the laying of an important corner stone; the opening of the Liberal campaign in Ontario by a number of cabinet Ministers; the Conservative banquet to Hon Mr. Foster in St. John and the retirement of Mr. Hardy from the Premiership of Ontario.

In imperial affairs we have had the continued despatch of British troops from the British Isles and India to South Africa, the departure, of General Buller to take command, the engagement of an enormous tonnage of transports, the calling out of the reserves and the opening of Parliament in order to make financial provision for carrying on the war.
