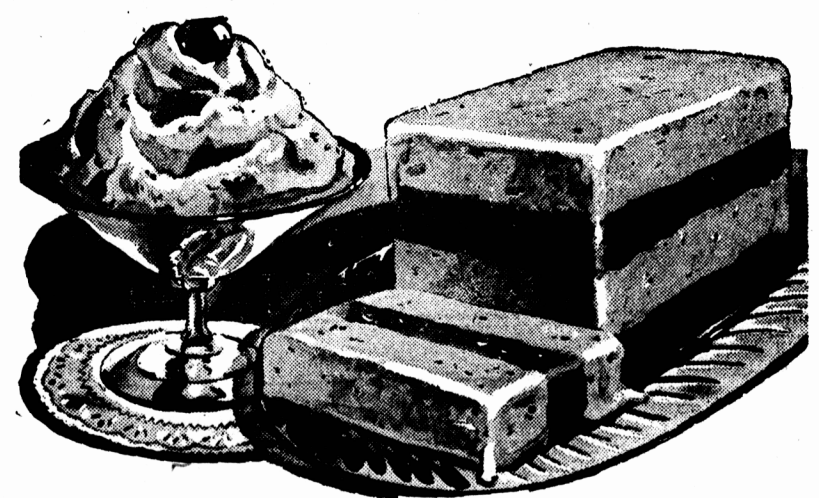

### To Observe Battle Of Britain Sunday At Summerside

Battle of Britain Sunday, the day every year when R.C.A.F. units everywhere honor the memory of the gallant few who defeated the vastly superior German force over the skies of Britain in the late summer of 1940, will be observed this coming Sunday. The following program has been released from the R.C.A.F. station, Summerside of the form that the observance will take in Atlantic Canada. The times given are Atlantic standard.

1 p.m. parade will form up on St. Stephen Street facing the Queen Hotel.  
1:20 p.m. the parade under the command of S/L W. L. Gillespie and headed by the Misicouche brass band will move all along Water Street, west on Fitzroy Street, north on Summer Street to Memorial Park.  
1:35 p.m. march past—His Honor Lieutenant Governor J. A. Bernard will take the salute on Water Street.  
1:50 p.m. arrive at Memorial Park.  
1:55 p.m. Lieutenant Governor Bernard and S/L W. C. Langstaff, commanding officer, R.C.A.F. station, Summerside, will lay wreaths on the war memorial in memory of those who died in the Battle of Britain, following which the Last Post and the National Anthem will be played.  
1:55 p.m. parade will move to Spring Street to Trinity United Church and St. Paul's Church.  
The service at St. Paul's Church will be conducted by Father H. S. Wright, officiating Roman Catholic clergyman for R.C.A.F. station, Summerside.  
The service at Trinity United Church will be conducted by the Rev. W. J. Barras with the Rev. W. Bilson, Rev. Charles Garney and Rev. K. G. Sullivan assisting.  
The public are cordially invited to participate in the church services at 2 p.m.  
The Summerside Air Cadet Squadron will form one flight in the parade.
