France's Six Year Reign Over Tennis World Nears End

England's Tennis Stars Smash Way To Two Victories As Cochet And Merlin Fall Before Perry And Austin.

AUTEUIL, France, July 28.—(A. P.)—The French Davis Cup tennis defence crumbled unexpectedly today with the defeat of Henri Cochet in the singles and England smashed through for two victories that forecast, simultaneously, the end of France's six-year reign and the first British triumph since 1912.

We notice where the Halifax Herald refers to the shooting of Capt. A. W. Allan at the P. E. I. Provincial Rifle Matches last week, when he made 188 points out of a possible 190, and states that Sgt. J. B. Saunders of the Annapolis Regiment in the first day of the N. S. R. A. meet at Bedford last year, made 37 bulls and an inner with 38 shots, scoring 189 out of 190 points. He scored 10 bulls at 500 yards, six bulls and an inner at 200 yards, 7 bulls at 300 yds, 7 in the extra series and 7 in the first range of the Standfield Match at 300. Added together these bulls total 37 and an inner out of 38 shots made up as follows—21 at 300 yards, 7 from them extra series; 10 at 500 yards and 6 bulls and an inner at 200 yards.

Capt. Allan's performance is much more meritorious in that his shooting was done at more difficult ranges and there was no extra series in it, which is really not his match but more like a practice. His scores were made as follows—10 bulls at 200 yards, 7 bulls at 300

MARITIME SCULLERS BOW TO DEFEAT

HENLEY COURSE, Port Dalhousie, Ont., July 28.—Maritime hopes of bringing the association singles title east from the Royal Canadian Henley Regatta were dashed today as a dark horse invader defeated three of their scullers and carried the title across the border.

Beating down a determined challenge R. Ingraham, made in the last few yards, P. L. Brower, of the Potomac Boating Club, Washington, D. C., crossed the finish line a length ahead of the Saint John sculler in eight minutes and five seconds. Ingraham battled Brower all the way down the mile and 550 yard course but the wealthy Washingtonian had enough staying power to last.

D. Wallace, of Halifax Jubilee's was good enough to pick off third position, a short distance back, beating out R. L. Patterson of Dartmouth Mimams who was fourth, and V. Price of Brookville, Ont., the junior champion, who finished in fifth position.

HENLEY COURSE, Port Dalhousie, Ont., July 28.—Pointing for a second Royal Canadian Henley Regatta championship in as many years, Buffalo West Sides held seven national titles tonight as they prepared to battle for a share of the 11 crowns still unwon.

The invaders, youthful, unorthodox, today outshone the best efforts of Canadian Clubs on the second day of the Henley meet won four titles and added them to the trio they picked up yesterday to give them a clear lead in the club standing.

The youthful Buffalo band who disdain to row by the book but have plenty of the brawn and courage it takes to win cleaned up in the junior eights, he junior doubles, the international 140-pound fours and the intermediate 15-pound fours.

Brookville oarsmen won themselves two national crowns in the only club performance that rivaled West Sides'. V. Price brought them the junior singles and they also took the junior 140-pound eights. Toronto Argonauts won the junior 140-pound singles, Hamilton the 150-pound eights and Toronto Dons the junior 140-pound doubles because, no one else was entered.

P. L. Brower, wealthy Washington D. C. sculler, who scratched his entry in the quarter mile dash yesterday took the association singles with an impressive length win over R. Ingraham, of Saint John, N. B., in 8.05. D. Wallace of Halifax Jubilee's took third place, Patterson of Dartmouth Mimams and Price of Brookville, junior singles champion was fifth.
