Cook's Corner

CREAM OF CARROT SOUP

Cream of carrot soup for four calls for two cups of chopped carrot, two tablespoons of chopped onion, two tablespoons of butter, two cups of milk, four tablespoons of flour, salt and pepper to taste.

Cook the carrots and onions in two cups of water for 10 minutes. Press through a sieve. Melt butter. Add flour. Cook until frothy. Add vegetable puree, and milk and stir until thickened. Add seasonings.

MERINGUES

3 egg whites
1 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vinegar

Beat the egg whites at room temperature; add the salt and beat till foamy. Add the sugar gradually, continuing to beat all the time. Add the vinegar and vanilla. Put a greased sheet of wax paper on a cookie sheet. Drop the meringue by tablespoons on the wax paper. Bake in a 300 deg. F oven about 30 to 35 minutes. Take meringues from wax paper. To serve put meringues together in pairs with apricot jam and top with sweetened and flavored whipped cream.

Modern Etiquette

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Household Scrapbook

Paint Spots

Painters sometimes leave some unsightly spotted spots on the pavements or front steps, but they can be removed by washing with a strong solution of polish, allowing the solution to soak in. After the paint spots are dry, wash off with soap and water, then rinse with cold water.

Rag Rugs

Rag Rugs will not curl on the ends after washing, and will also keep cleaner much longer, if a little starch is added to the rinse water.

Aluminum Pans

As aluminum pans require less heat for cooking, excess heat often causes them to bulge out on the bottoms. To straighten them out, heat the pans slowly and when hot pound the bottoms lightly with a hammer.
