—FIRE IN COAL PILE—Fire broke out yesterday afternoon in a coal pile owned by Joseph Read and Co. Ltd., Summerside, but it was extinguished without difficulty and no damage was caused.

—ALTERATIONS MADE—An extensive alteration job is being made to the south wing of the Summerside High School. The door which gave access to the building on this wing is being closed off and the entry space and hall space is being made into another classroom. Last year there was considerable congestion and more classroom space was badly needed.

—GAME ACT CONVICTIONS—In Stipendiary Magistrate Richard S. Hinton's Court at Summerside on Tuesday morning three men from West Devon, Central Bedouque and Halifax respectively were assessed fines and costs totalling \$16.00 for angling without license. The offences were committed at Bedouque and Glenwood. The case of two men charged with netting trout was adjourned for a week at the request of Counsel for the defence, Henry M. Noonan, K.C. Summerside. Charges in this case were laid under the Special Fishery Regulations for the Province of Prince Edward Island which is a Federal Statute. The prosecutions were conducted by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
