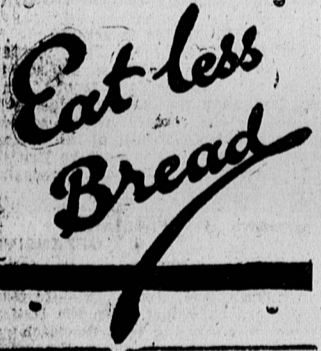

### War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN.

#### WATCH FOR EGG CLUSTERS.

Tomatoes need a certain amount of attention just at present. Remember that they figure as one of the most valuable salad crops and they are especially good when canned.

They should be kept well staked up, and this is particularly desirable if the earth around them is wet or heavy. Otherwise the tomatoes are apt to lie on the ground and rot. In some of the plants the shoots should be reduced to one leader so as to give early fruit. They get a better chance to ripen if the foliage is kept well pruned for then the sun and air can get at the tomatoes and hasten their development.

The same bug that ravages the potato plant often finds its way to the tomato plant and works havoc there. Last year this pest was particularly active and it is quite time to be on the look out for it now. Most people think that if the bugs are taken off all is well. This is a mistake. Much more dangerous than the well-known Colorado potato beetle is the orange-colored egg masses which cling to the leaves on the under side. Hundreds of small bugs are hatched from these clusters. Life should be promptly crushed out of the egg masses whenever they are discovered.

### WO THOUSAND SAILORS LOST THEIR LIVES

VENICE, June 18.—Commander Rizzo, whose remarkable exploit in sinking an Austrian battleship in the Adriatic, has thrilled Italy, tells a graphic story of the encounter in which he took part, and during which another Austrian battleship was either badly damaged or destroyed by another motor-boat in charge of Commander Milazzo. It is possible that two thousand sailors were lost during the encounter.

"I am sorry for the sailors who lost their lives," he said in beginning his story, "but am glad that we got the dreadnought. Why they had ventured out of the Pola harbor no one knows, but it was certainly foolish for them to do so.

"I was on patrol scout duty as usual off the Dalmatian coast, near Pass Solva, between the islands of Anselmo and Preluda. I had just finished my patrol, and, as it would soon be daylight had turned for my base, when, while ten miles away, I saw a great enveloping cloud of smoke. It appeared like a blot through the early daylight. I thought at first it was some boat which had discovered me and was giving chase. I determined that the safest course was to turn back and get it before it got me. Here is where my luck, as my friends call it, looked for misfortune, as it is no fun to be chased.

"Anyway, I determined to make the best of a bad fix. After turning back I said to my two crews of ten men to each boat: 'Fellows, the Italian scout boats have been waiting for two years, and the whole Italian navy has been trying to destroy Austrian ships for three years. Are you willing to risk all on chance of obtaining glory and the country's gratitude?'

"To a man they answered 'Yes.' 'We were speeding back with our motors muffled, when, to my amazement, I discovered two battleships surrounded by a number of destroyers, which I later counted as ten. I assigned the second battleship to the other motor boat, while I took the first.'

### GERMANY EAGER TO GET RINTELEN OUT OF DURANCE

NEW YORK, June 15.—Captain Franz von Rintelen alias Hansen, alias Gasche, alias Gates, etc., leader of the German bomb plotters in the United States, and for whom the German Government is trying to exchange an American prisoner of war, was said, when a captive in England three years ago, to be Duke Adolph of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, a relative of the German Emperor. At the time of his trial here there also were persistent reports that he bore a much closer relationship to the Emperor, but one which was not officially recognized.

Von Rintelen and ten other plotters were convicted here last February of attempting to blow up American ships and were sentenced to the Atlanta penitentiary for a year and a half and fined \$2,000 each.

One of the most prominent members of the German war party, at the head of which was the Crown Prince Frederick William, von Rintelen was the intimate of the Emperor and Prince Henry of Prussia. He was for years a big official of the Deutsche Bank. His wife, member of a wealthy Berlin family named Kauffmann, is one of the society leaders of Berlin.

When the war started, von Rintelen was in Berlin. A high official of the Government sent for him, and asked him to accept a newly-created office under the General Staff of the German navy. It was then that he decided to come, or was sent to the United States to foment strikes, and bring about Mexican intervention. The destruction of ships and the burning of factories and Government property followed.

Von Hintelen's supply of funds seemed to be inexhaustible, and evidence at his trial indicated that many of the men he supposed he

### had enlisted in the service of the Fatherland were taking from him all the cash they could get their hands on without doing anything in return.

They seemed to regard him an "easy mark."

#### German Bluff Called.

Washington, June 9.—The German Government, threatening mistreatment of Americans because of the imprisonment of the bomb plotter Franz Rintelen, has been warned by the United States to remember that such a step will draw swift retaliatory action upon the thousands of Germans in this country.

Germany's threat and the answer of the United States were disclosed by the State Department. In a note presented by the Swiss Minister here the Berlin Foreign Office proposed to exchange for Rintelen Siegfried Paul London, a German-born naturalized American citizen serving ten years in prison in Germany for acting as a Russian spy. Notice was given that an answer to this proposal was awaited before putting into execution contemplated measures of reprisal against Americans in Germany because of the failure of the previous efforts to relieve Hintelen.

#### WHEATLESS SPICE CAKE

It is not always easy to make a satisfactory cake without using some wheat flour, but here is a recipe which has been tried in the Experimental Kitchen of the Department of Home Economics at Washington and is given us by the Monroe County Defence Committee.

Cream 1-4 cup of fat and 1 cup of sugar and mix well. Sift 3 cups of barley flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon allspice, 2 teaspoons cinnamon and 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg. Add these ingredients alternately with 1 cup of

### sour milk to the other mixture and mix thoroughly. Beat the whites of the eggs stiffly and fold into the batter. Bake for 1 hour in a moderate oven. The temperature should be raised slightly after the cake has been in the oven about twenty minutes.—Rochester Herald.
