Picked Haphazardly  
"They seem to have come down and haphazardly picked out prominent citizens and shot them as a token of intimidation of the population," said the Norwegian telegraph agency here in commenting on the first 10 executed.

The acts of sabotage which provoked the executions and the state of emergency under which they were arrested were not clearly explained, but the Germans have been trying to push ahead construction of a marine base and airfield at Trondheim with 25,000 military workers.

Reports in London said an effort had been made to wreck the Trondheim-Moscow railway and that the German navy base was suspended when a motor station at Tannheim was dynamited.

Fined For Raid  
Oslo, too, was reported tonight to have come under German repressive measures with levying of a \$500,000 fine on individual Norwegian patriots to pay for the damage done to Viking Quisling's headquarters in the British museum plane raid of Sept. 25. Individuals were reported assessed amounts ranging from \$200 to \$6,000.

Although Norway have the brunt of German pressure to force into being a northern "Germanic" confederation including the Netherlands, Denmark also was the focal point of Nazi attention.

Denmark Too  
The German radio said Danish tension, apparent in popular hostility toward Danish free corps soldiers on leave from the Russian front, was receiving the attention of the Wilhelmstrasse. The Oslo radio said classes were increasing.

The projected Germanic confederation, Scandinavian quarters in London suggested, in turn would be a means of forcing Sweden into the German orbit.

Elsewhere in Europe, it was reported by Yugoslav sources that 80 Semur were shot by Germans at Semur, near Belgrade, last month after a Nazi airplane target was blown up.

The Berlin radio confirmed reports that a bomb was tossed in a Paris motion picture theatre last night during the showing of an anti-Jewish picture and two persons killed and 24 wounded.

Meanwhile, the British government disclosed that it has proposed creation of a United Nations commission through which would be channelled the investigation of all crimes by army and Gestapo occupation authorities.

The announcement said President Roosevelt already had expressed willingness to co-operate and that exiled governments here had given their approval.

MONTREAL, Oct. 6-(CP)-The Montreal City and District League, a senior "B" circuit last season, has discontinued operations for the duration of the war, it was announced today.

Hitherto the only exemption for clergymen was to regulars, laymen or ministers of religious organizations and "members of the clergy or religious orders."

The change is believed to be designed to meet the case of clergymen for the ministry in the Protestant denominations who do not ordinarily receive orders or become members of the church until they complete their education.
