P.E. Island Pharmaceutical Association Examinations

WHY COLLEGE GIRLS DO MARRY

The colleges for women certainly have a hard time acting as horrible examples. In Colorado a few weeks ago they decided to drive girls out of a coeducational Presbyterian college and now two limelighters in the university of Pittsburgh are demanding that women's colleges be closed and co-educational ones be established because, forsooth, college girls do not marry and fail to contribute their quota to the future of the race.

The example from which this conclusion is drawn is Wellesley, whose statistics are marvellous to prove that its graduates are letting the native stock die out. Wellesley is just outside of Boston, and fifty years ago, before Wellesley was founded, there was complaint that the girls of native Massachusetts families did not marry, and that when they did, they had only one or two children. The talk about "race suicide"—although there was no Roosevelt to invent that name, and the talk had to be rather mealy-mouthed or that reason—began right there in Massachusetts and it began before Wellesley was thought of. On the "post hoc" theory, race suicide is the cause of Wellesley, rather than Wellesley the cause of race suicide. Boston girls who wouldn't or couldn't marry made a college to fit them for some sort of single usefulness.

It is so easy to compile statistics of college girls who do not marry and of those who marry so late that their families are small. And it is easy, and probably just, to attribute a certain proportion of that failure to the fact that college girls are so much interested in themselves, and their "careers" that they do not invite, or do scarce off, the attentions of young men. But such statistics will be useless until somebody compiles the statistics of an equal number of girls of the same general social grade, who do not go to college, and then shows that the proportion of marriages and babies is larger among such girls than among college girls.

Such statistics are hard to get, but any man can compile a table of his own among his friends and the friends of his children. Here in the city girls who only go to High School or finishing schools, and then become clerks or stenographers, or who just stay at home and help their mothers, do not marry any faster than the college girls do. The clerks and stenographers meet young men enough in their business, and yet the ranks of girls in offices are not depleted by

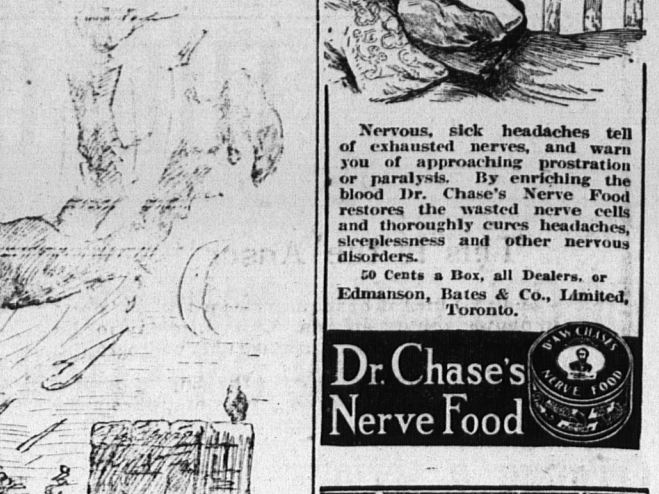

As there were not enough infantry within striking distance at the time to successfully defend the position the commanding officer decided to anticipate the German offensive by throwing his cavalry at the centre of the onrushing German mass. Just as the Uhlans swept over the hill the French cavalry advanced on the dead run to meet them.
