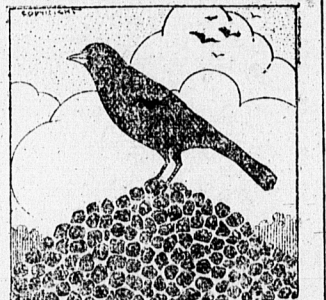
AVIATOR GILMORE FALLS TO HIS DEATH.
