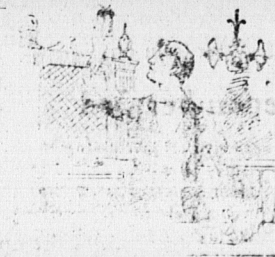

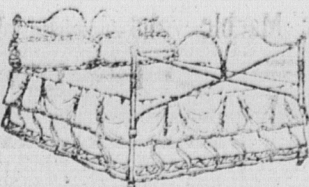

THE CHEESE BOARD

The Prince Edward Island Cheese Board was organized July 4, 1890, some eight years ago. Its formation grew out of the necessities of the cheese industry, so greatly developed under the factory system. It was felt that a central body could greatly assist the cheese business, and it has done so in many ways. At the time of the Board's organization the price of cheese ranged from eight and one eighth to eight and three eighths cents per pound, as against eleven and one eighth at the recent Board meeting. It will be seen that the price has progressed upward very considerably in the eight years, due primarily to an advance in the world's markets, and also in part to improved methods in manufacture, and the more uniform and better quality of the product.

That the Cheese Board is a necessity for the successful prosecution of the industry is on all hands admitted. That being so, it would seem to follow that every factory should belong to it. The membership fee of \$1 is little more than the cost of a single market cable, which averages about \$1.50, and yet we are surprised to learn that only about one half the factories are associated under the Board.

We cannot believe that more pecuniary considerations prevent them from joining, but it seems hardly fair that all the factories whether in or out of the association get the full benefit of the cables sold for by one half their number. A proper consideration of the existing conditions and of the necessity for a central Board, to keep in touch with the market and afford facilities for buying and selling, ought to bring many more of the factories into full membership.

It is needless to point out that the Cheese Board cannot be conducted without some expenditure of money. A place for the fortnightly meetings must be rented, the cable tolls must be paid, the services of a secretary are imperative and he cannot be expected to give his services gratuitously. And yet, if the Board is to continue its work, so important to the factories at large, it must have a membership sufficient to meet its running expenses. We know of no other means by which the factories can obtain the same information and the same facilities for disposing of their products at the highest market rates as by membership and we trust that next year the Board may have the hearty and united support of the factories all over the Island.

Rather slow progress is being made in the selection of new Ministers to fill the Cabinet at Ottawa. This may indicate both the difficulties of the situation and the care taken in making the selection. In Hon. Dr. Pugsley, the Premier has undoubtedly secured a brilliant and able colleague. For the Ontario vacancy there is no man of like outstanding prominence within the party and the selection is not so easily made. Sir Wilfrid follows the late Sir John Macdonald in the deliberation with which he chooses his associates. In the Government, but this is the prudent course and the country will be repaid for the delay if the best possible choice is made.

THE MONETARY SITUATION.

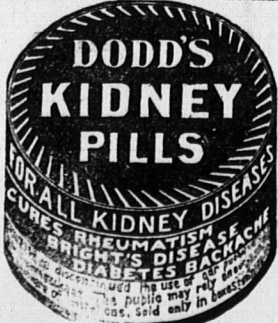
There is more gold, silver and banknotes in the world than ever before, and yet the world has not enough money yet to carry on its vastly extended business. There is almost in every country more buying and selling, more importing and exporting a greater production of the fruits of the earth and of the products of industrial skill and labor than ever before. The railroads have been taxed with transportation beyond their capacity and this notwithstanding their utmost efforts to double track and extend their roads, and put on more and larger engines and cars. Factories and mines have extended their operations.

All this requires more and more money, and there has not been enough to go round. Money became scarce and dear. Among other results there has been a vast liquidation in stocks and securities, the values of which had been greatly inflated, but have shrunk enormously during the past few months. The shrinkage in value of securities dealt with in Wall Street has exceeded \$3,000,000,000. British consols have also been selling lower than ever before in the history of the nation. But Henry Clay's weekly circular tells that the monetary situation, though far from satisfactory, is improving.

DELINQUENT REPRESENTATIVES.

The political and trade Parliaments seem to assimilate so closely as is desirable. The St. John Star points out that while the sixty Senators and Members of the Commons, and the one hundred and fifteen members of the Maritime Provincial Legislative Assemblies were invited to attend the recent meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, only six of them put in an appearance and five of those who did so were delegates. This is indeed regrettable as there were so many matters of vital interest to Eastern Canada discussed at the Board meeting. The absent politicians surely missed a rare opportunity to acquaint themselves at first hand with the merchants, shippers, producers and manufacturers are thinking about and of getting much information of value to representative public men. We hope that next year the politicians will attend the Maritime Trade meeting in much larger numbers.

A letter from Col. Gourdeau of the Marine Department to Mr. Lord, the department's agent here tells that a self-bailing life boat for the life-saving station at this port has been ordered. Mr. Lord expects



to receive in the near future instructions to erect buildings in which to house the life-saving apparatus to be provided. This is so far satisfactory, but whether all this will be done in time for service when most needed in the coming stormy season remains to be seen.
