BASEBALL Brooklyn Dodgers Divide Twin Bill

NEW YORK, Sept. 26-(AP)-Brooklyn Dodgers, by dividing a doubleheader with New York Giants today, managed a 12-10 edge in their Intercity National Baseball League series.

The Giants won the opener 9-5 but the Dodgers came back, with Luke Hamlin pitching a four-hitter, to win the seven-inning nightcap, 3-2. Darkness halted the contest.

In Cincinnati, Billy Myers propelled the Reds to within one victory of their first pennant in 20 years, his homerun with two aboard defeated St. Louis Cardinals 3-1 in the first game of their crucial doubleheader making it relatively unimportant Cardinals took the second 6-0.

At Philadelphia, steady hurling by Kirby Higbe gave the last-place Phillies a 5-3 victory over Boston and ended a six-game losing streak. The game was the Phil's 45th victory of the season.

Prospective Rivals In World Series Are Put Under Microscope

NEW YORK, Sept. 26-(AP)-The Yankees, cruising into their fourth consecutive world series with their customary calm, find themselves in a predicament that may have no precedent in baseball.

Just as sure as Judge Landis is the boss of baseball, the National League representative in the classic opening next Wednesday will be Cincinnati - with the two most heroic hurlers of the year in Paul Derringer and William Henry Halladay.

Furthermore, the provision for a day of rest between the second and third, and sixth and seventh games of the series means that numerical superiority is worthless.

If the Reds squeeze out the St. Louis Cardinals as they now do, they are perfectly capable of doing Derringer and Halladay's work. The first game of the world series and is available again in the sixth and seventh should the series last that long.

Will MacKenzie has given no hint as to which would start the first series struggle.

While MacKenzie is choosing between two aces, Manager Joe McCarthy of the Yanks must play with one ace and a handful of kings.

Charley (Rufus the Red) Ruffing with 21 victories and seven defeats in his 18th season in the majors, will start the first game this year, just as he did last October and in 1936. But whether he is as strong now as he was previously is open to question.

Lefty Gomez, the southpaw with a sizzling fast ball and a meandering curve, certainly is not the pitcher now who won six world series without ever being beaten. Starting 26 times this year, two less than Steve Sundra, sporting an unbroken string of 11 victories, was a relief man most of the season. He probably will be relegated to that role in the series.

On the northern flank of the front between the Rhine and Moselle Rivers.

The general staff's evening communique showed that German fighting spread from the sector south of Zweibrücken to a parallel region south of Pirmasens, 12 miles to the east on the other side of France's Hornbach salient.

Infiltrating Gradually It was through this rugged area that the French had been infiltrating gradually. Moving north from the Biche plateau, military dispatches said, they seized border villages and occupied crests around Hornbach, took the town and pushed on to Hornbach.

On the eastern end of the north flank the French communique said a German surprise attack at dawn in the Lauter River valley was repulsed. Dispatches said a German raiding party attempted to take a farm near the no-man's-land village of Saint Paul north of the French border town of Wissembourg but was turned back.

French troops, after three weeks of fighting through westward outposts, were said to have come into contact with a principal field of pillboxes and trenches around Hornbach.

An indication of an increase in activity in this sector was given in military dispatches which formerly reported companies of 250 men in action. They now said battalions of 1,000 were engaging in combat.
